The funeral of the late Conroy Hermans will take place at 3 o'clock tomorrow.

The Princess arrived last night at 7.55 and the express at ten o'clock.

The Cacouns arrived at 8 o'clock last night from Montreal with a large general cargo.

W. P. DOULL read a very interesting paper on Radium before the Epworth League of Methodist Church last night.

The firemen were called out yesterday afternoon at 5.45. The alarm was for a small blaze in a barn opposite the Condensed Milk Factory which was extinguished by a bucket of water.

The City of London will reach here this (Saturday) evening and make a single early trip to Crapaud on Monday morning. On Monday afternoon she will go to Vernon River Bridge to load potatoes.

Grant vs Robert Sebastian and James Mooney, Peake's Station for assault occasioning actual bodily harm was concluded at midnight Thursday night before Judge (Saturdays) Blanchard at Georgetown. The two first offenders were each fined \$30 and the third \$10 and all three parties of the suit were bound over to keep the peace. The Magistrate also said that if a complaint were again laid against Grant for carrying a revolver he would be dealt with the fullest extent of the law. The defendants were represented by W. A. Weeks not by J. A. M. as was stated.

**EDITOR'S MAIL.**

**WANTED, LETTER BOXES IN CARS.**

Sir:—I would like space in your paper to again speak of a matter which last year received considerable airing through the press but like many more matters was let drop at that. I refer to the matter of placing a letter box in the baggage cars of the P. E. I. Railway. As the mails go at present you can only mail letters at certain times of the day in any of the post offices here and as the freight train coming west in summer carries a local mail up to a great many offices along the line, I cannot see why we should not have equal privileges with our Eastern friends. There is a mail goes East in the afternoon trains from some of the offices which get his local mail in the afternoon. As I have known people drive 10 miles to mail a letter in the afternoon to go East and then would have to look for some one to carry it for them and either deliver it in person or mail it in Summerside. Now one mail box in each baggage-car West would take up no room and would give people a chance to mail letters going East. If this car should return West from Summerside, as is very often the case, the mail clerk could open the box in Summerside and transfer any mail found therein to the different mail cars for distribution. If the rest of it should be for Summerside, which no doubt it would be, it could be either sent to Summerside P. O., or deposited in the letter-box at the railway station. I have often wondered why some or all of our Western merchants and business men at O'Leary, Bloomfield, etc., did not take up this matter, as I have seen them looking for chances to mail letters and coxing trainmen and others to carry stamped letters to mail in Summerside or in the Eastern mail car, and not only from these places but all along the line.
