ward Jon. "Lisbeth isn't back is she?"

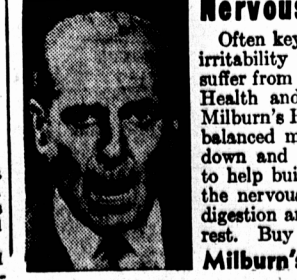
