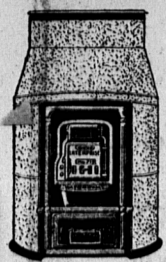


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Capt. Thompson New Usher of Black Rod

OTTAWA, Ont., July 2.—Captain Andrew Ruthven Thompson, son of Col. Andrew Thompson, formerly Liberal member for Haldimand County and well known parliamentary counsel, has been appointed by the Government to the position of Usher of the Black Rod in succession to the late Colonel Ernest Chambers.

Captain Thompson is a veteran of the Great War having served as an officer in the fourth battalion, being slightly wounded early in the war and afterwards badly wounded at Passchendaele. In fact, up to within two years Captain Thompson was incapacitated as a result of his wounds and was not able to work. He has now, however, recovered.

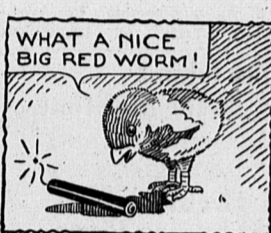

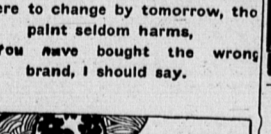

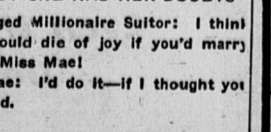
