LIVED ON EARTH 112 YEARS.

Belleville, Ill., Feb. 6. James Edwards, colored, probably the oldest inhabitant of St. Clair County, died at the County Hospital last night, aged 112 years. "Old Jim," as he was called, was admitted to the hospital on Dec. 6 from Centerville Station. He was born a slave in Virginia and claimed to have been well acquainted with George Washington. After the death of his old master he became cook for General Stonewall Jackson, and after the war located in St. Clair County and worked as a laborer until he was 100 years old.

GREAT BRITAIN AND EGYPT.

When Great Britain in 1882 undertook the task of restoring order in Egypt and putting her finances on a better basis, in order that the latter country may repay the money loaned her by British subjects, it was not intended that British troops should remain in Egypt after order was restored. But at no time since then could they have safely been withdrawn. Through the firm and just rule of the British, though it has been much hindered by sundry restrictions, much good has accrued to Egypt. For some years past it has been evident that Great Britain did not have much idea of speedily withdrawing her troops. The people who have most strongly objected to the remaining of the British troops are the French. Recently during the excitement over the Fashoda affair the people of Great Britain have strongly urged Lord Salisbury to declare that Egypt and the Sudan are now a British protectorate. This Lord Salisbury was unwilling, at the time at least, to do as it would have been a cause of increasing irritation to the French; but what Lord Salisbury did not then do has practically been done by his trustee agent Lord Cromer, who has been in effect the British governor of Egypt, though his title is that of Consul-General and Agent in Chief of the British Government.

Lord Kitchener recently asked for and received subscriptions to build a Gordon Memorial College at Khartoum for the education of the Soudanese. Lord Cromer lately made a journey up the Nile to Khartoum, laid the corner stone of the college and gave a reception to the native chiefs. In addressing them he told them that Lord Kitchener, was to be their Governor and that they were to be loyal to the Queen and to the Khedive. In this address he made no mention of Turkey. Egypt is nominally a Turkish possession and every year a sum of money is paid in tribute to the Egyptian government to the Sultan. Naturally we would suppose that the Egyptian provinces of the Soudan would also be under Turkish authority. Lord Cromer's speech indicates that the British do not intend to acknowledge the Sultan's authority in the Soudan, and it may be that the time will soon come when his authority will no longer be acknowledged in Egypt. The position taken by the British in the Soudan is probably the forerunner of the intimation that may be made in the near future that Britain intends to make Egypt a British possession.
