In Memoriam

MRS. WALTER GRANT

As the midnight hour of Nov. 7th was approaching the gentle spirit of Mrs. Walter Grant (formerly Annie Delahanty) quietly winged its flight to Him Who created it. Born in County Kilkenny, Ireland in 1850 she with her mother, brothers, and sister came to P. E. I. when she was eight years of age, making the voyage across the Atlantic in a sail boat. After a time they settled in Cherry Valley where they kept what was known as the Ten Mile House. She loved to relate stories of the early days which were always intermingled with her ready wit and humor.

In 1872 she married Walter Grant of Millbrook, who was then a widower with four children, whom she cared and worked for as her own. She possessed a very gentle and refined disposition and was always happy when she was able to lend a helping hand or make others happy.

For the past 24 years she spent the winter months in Massachusetts making her home with her son, Dr. Joseph Grant and usually came to her Island home in the summer. When she realized her health was failing she wished to come to the old home and made her last trip from the U. S. about a year ago. She was accompanied by her daughter, Marion. She received the best medical attention and was tenderly nursed by her three daughters, Marion, Mrs. Jas. Carmichael and Mrs. J. J. MacInnis, who were constantly by her bedside for the last weeks of her life and who with her son, Vincent and his family were with her when she passed away.

All during her life she manifested that true Irish faith and always gave generously to any charitable purpose. She was fully resigned to the will of God, and passed peacefully away fortified by the last consoling rites of the Holy Catholic Church, administered by her pastor, Rev. Messrs. Maurice MacDonald, who frequently visited her during her illness.

She leaves to mourn besides her step-children, A. J. Grant, Stewart, Mrs. D. R. McDonald, Orwell, and Mrs. J. A. McEachern.

A large concourse of people attended the funeral, which was held on Nov. 10th, to St. Joachim's Church, Vernon River, where a Requiem Mass was sung, for the repose of her soul, by the pastor, who also officiated at the grave.
