FOR THE HOUSEWIFE.

Stuffed potatoes are made by mixing cheese and bread crumbs in with the contents.

When boiling fresh potatoes try putting in a sprig of mint in the water to give a delicious flavor to the vegetables.

Plaster figures in hard or alabaster finish are easily cleaned by dipping a stiff toothbrush in gasoline and scrubbing into all the crevices.

If you have a black gown that needs freshening, cleanse it thoroughly with clear, black coffee diluted with water and containing a little ammonia.

After the weekly washing rub a little vinegar and spirits of camphor over the hands. This will keep the hands in good condition summer and winter.

Garments that are being hung out to air can be put on hangers rather than pinned to the line. This prevents sagging or marking with the clothespins.

Never rinse lace in blue water with the idea of improving its color. Real lace should be finally rinsed in clear soft water, or, better still, in skim milk, which will give it a soft, creamy color.

Brica-brac, containing mother of pearl should never be cleaned with soap and water. Instead, it should be rubbed with a cloth dipped into whiting and water.

The meat balls, which must serve for one home dinner a week and which so often pall from their monotony, can be made to have a deliciously new taste. With a half pound of the meat mix the crumbs of two or three well toasted slices of bread, soften the mass with cream or rich milk and add half a cup of stewed tomatoes. Roll the meat into balls, season and sprinkle with a little dry flour and brown them with butter in a pan not too hot.

Hard-boiled eggs may be prepared in several ways for spinach. They blend better with the succulent vegetable if chopped finely and then mixed with a dressing of butter sauce. The mixture is poured over the spinach just before sending it to the table. Croustons of bread, fried in olive oil or beef fat, may be used with hard eggs, with the yoke dressed with oil, red pepper and salt and put back into the white. After being stuffed the half eggs are turned bottom side up and made into "porcupines" with crisp croustons.

The care of small articles of dress is quite as important as that of the larger garments. Much can be done, for instance, towards preserving the appearance of a hat if it is always kept in a box. Root trees are a necessity to the woman who wishes to look trim in the matter of footwear. Cuck hangers, too, are cheap but effective means of keeping mantles, blouses and so forth neat and shapely. The occasional use of a hot iron and a little care in folding will keep veils fresh and new for a long time. A veil is soon ruined if it is left tied around a hat, especially if it is damp at the time.

UTILIZING THE DOG FISH.

It is claimed that the policy of the Dominion Government in utilizing the dog-fish caught on the coast of the Maritime Provinces has proved quite profitable. Formerly the fishermen threw the dog-fish back into the sea. Now, there are Government dog-fish reduction works at Canoe N. S., Shippegan, N. B., and Clark's Harbor, in the Province of Quebec. Cecil Doure, of the Public Works Department at Ottawa, said recently: "In the plant at Canoe alone we turned out 14,000 gallons of oil and 2000 tons of fertilizer. The oil we sold at 30 cents per gallon, and the fertilizer brought 30 dollars per ton. It is sold mostly in the United States. The oil is used for treating leather in the manufacture of harness, but it is also particularly adapted for use in the manufacture of soap. Canadian soap-makers have not yet learned to purchase it, but it is hoped to find a market there in time. As it is a profitable industry it is being made of what was formerly a dead loss."

CAT CENSUS IN YOKOHAMA.

Yokohama, which prides itself upon being the most flourishing port in Japan, recently received a shock last year. It believed that its cat population was decreasing alarmingly.

With painstaking care that characterized Japanese officialdom the officers of the Kencho, or City Hall, set there agents to taking a census of the cats of Yokohama. There were 7,000 able bodied adult cats in all the confines of the city, these enumerators discovered; they even established the fact that less than a third of the cat population were males.

ABOUT DREAMING.

Dreams are the subjective result of external stimuli. In other words, the sleep is not deep enough, or sound enough to completely cut off communication with the outside world through the senses. Another author has defined dreaming as disordered mental activity. It seems difficult often to avoid dreaming, but if care is taken to ensure against digestive disturbances and to secure an airy, well-ventilated bedroom, and then to go to bed with a reasonable amount of physical fatigue, combined with absence of noise, it ought to be possible in time to regain sound, dreamless sleep.—Prof. Haliburton.
