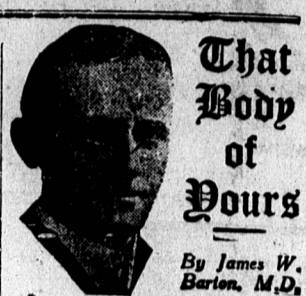

Sir,—We do not desire to see the question of the "shift bar" worn thread bare, but I would like to make a contribution to the discussion of recent experiences.

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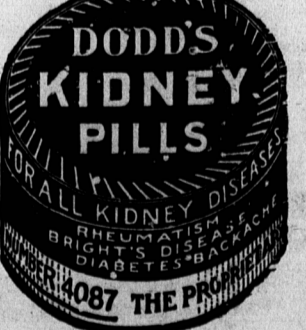
That Body of Yours By James W. Barton, M.D.
