Cooperatives, Study Clubs Are Discussed

A capacity crowd of Study Club members attended a meeting at which the Co-operative Movement was discussed at Wellington Station hall on November 30th. J. F. Arsenault presided and the speakers were: Rev. George McCormac, Rev. George Christie, O. F. Gallant and W. F. Rose.

Father McCormac and Rev. Mr. Christie spoke on the importance of co-operative thinking in our present Society. Cyrus F. Gallant explained the present Co-operative set-up in the area of Wellington. W. F. Rose, President of Consumer Co-operation of Mt. Stewart, and chairman of the Extension Department of St. Dunstan's College, spoke on the procedure to be followed in the application for a Provincial charter. There was considerable discussion on this question. Fifteen well attended meetings were held in the following districts during the past month: Wellington, Wellington Centre, Lot 16, Abrams Village, Urbanville, St. Nicholas, Chryseston, Egmont Bay, Cape Egmont, Mont Carmel, St. Raphael and Fifteen Point. As a result of these meetings over thirty Study Clubs were formed.

Organization of Study Clubs has continued during the past week in the Tignish district under the direction of Reverend George McCormac of the Extension Staff at St. Dunstan's College. It is expected that approximately 40 Study Clubs will be in active operation in the vicinity of Tignish during the coming winter.

A meeting of teachers held in Dallon School last Wednesday inaugurated a new phase in the program of Co-operative education. At this meeting, addressed by Father McCormac it was decided that a Teachers' Study Club would meet fortnightly in order to prepare a program of Co-operative Education to be used in the common schools.

The teachers do not intend to displace any of the traditional subjects in the curriculum but rather hope to throw a co-operative focus upon all of their teaching efforts.

In the Nail Pond School District Mr. J. J. Arsenault, presided at a meeting where the organization of three Study Clubs took place. Mr. Joseph E. Bernard acted as secretary.

In the Ascension School Reverend George McCormac, discussing the goal of Study Club activity, said, "There is a nobler end to our work than merely getting dollars and cents. We must strive to remedy the injustices of our present economic system." John N. Handrahan was chairman and J. B. Morrissey acted as secretary. Reverend J. N. Trainor also spoke. Gerard Gaudet was appointed leader of the Study Club which was organized.

At a meeting held in the home of James Chloessey on the same evening twenty-eight were present. John LeClair was elected secretary of the Study Club. Leo Gaudet
