Mr. George A. Hughes, Financial Steward, Trinity United Church, Charlottetown, P. E. I.

Honored Sir and Respected Steward:

Tonight as we gather here for our monthly meeting, we are reminded that (Tempus is Fugit), Time is Flying. In the summer of 1925, twenty-two years ago when the United Church of Canada came into being, you were elected Financial Steward of Trinity United Church a position you have held ever since with marked distinction and with a high and sacred devotion to your office.

During those years you have come in contact with hundreds of Trinity's people, and to them all you have endeared yourself, as Trinity's Grand Old Man, with your cheery smile, your friendly disposition, and your kind and genial personality. You have seen the finances of this Church grow from a modest amount to the high peak they are in at the present time, and in which you played a very prominent part.

During your long term of office in the Stewards you have seen a large number of members come and go, and to them all you have been a staunch friend and kindly adviser.

Tonight's meeting serves two purposes, we are honoring you tonight as you held office for the last time as Financial Steward, you having tendered your resignation at the first of the year to take effect June 30th, which we reluctantly were obliged to accept, but we are cheered and heartened to know that you will be staying on the Stewards for what we fervently hope and pray will be for years to come.

We are also honoring you tonight on the near approach of your ninety-first birthday, a record which many strive for, but which few attain.

In closing on behalf of the Stewards of Trinity United Church, we ask you to kindly accept this gift as a remembrance of our happy associations with one of the Pillars of Trinity Church in the person of George Andrew Hughes, and we know that we are voicing the sentiments and feelings not only of the congregation of this grand old historic church, but of your countless friends throughout the city and province when we say that we hope and trust you will be spared for many years to thoroughly enjoy the twilight of a most active life so freely and cheerfully given to Church and State.

Though taken completely by surprise, Mr. Hughes expressed his thanks in a speech which brought out many interesting highlights of the Church history. Mr. Hughes also stressed the importance of laymen's work in the Church, and the great spiritual benefits to be gained.

Following Mr. Hughes talk, Mr. E. E. Mutch and Dr. Rice expressed the sincere thanks of the Board to Mr. Hughes for his conscientious discharging of the duties of Financial Steward.

Mr. Hughes will remain on the Board, of which he is a life member, and his fellow members look to him for advice and guidance in the future.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Painting the bottom step of the cellar stairs white makes it more conspicuous and often helps to prevent accidents.

A very slight smear of vaseline along the edge of a door that sticks will ease it and preserve the wood.

A damp cloth rubbed over a carpet first before sweeping will prevent the dust flying about the room.

Eggs can be whisked considerably quicker if a teaspoon of warm water is added to them first.

Just add a little baking powder to the mixture for meringues. This prevents them from falling in.

Fine fabrics should be washed with careful gentleness and squeezed in a thick towel instead of wringing them in the hands.

THE FRENCH WAY

Spring has come and the housewife has forsaken the canned vegetables of winter for the more colorful vitamin-rich garden produce now showing in all markets. Asparagus appearing in more quantity is tasty enough just boiled and served with butter, but those seeking something different might try preparing this vegetable the way they do in France. The cooked asparagus tips are dipped in a

COOK'S CORNER

CHOCOLATE COFFEE CAKE

- 2/3 cup butter, 2 cups sugar, 2 eggs, 1/2 cup milk, 1 square chocolate, 1/4 cup strong coffee, 2 1/2 cups flour, 2 1/2 teaspoons all phosphate baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla extract.

Beat butter and sugar until light and creamy, adding the well-beaten yolks of the eggs as soon as the butter and sugar are well mixed; then put in the chocolate which has been softened by standing over hot water, coffee and milk. Add flour, baking powder and salt sifted together, then vanilla. Beat vigorously, and at the last moment before baking fold in the stiffly-beaten whites of the eggs. Bake about 1/2 of an hour in 2 loaf cake pans, using a moderate oven (350 F.). Frost, if desired.

FRUIT SANDWICH LOAF

- 2 1/2 cups flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon baking soda, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 1/2 cup bran, 1 cup raisins or mixed dried fruits, dates, etc., 2 eggs, slightly beaten, 1 cup milk, 1/8 cup brown sugar, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 2 tablespoons shortening, melted.

Sift flour, measure, add baking powder, soda and salt; sift again and add bran and fruit; mix well. Combine eggs, milk, brown sugar, lemon juice and melted shortening (slightly cooled); pour into flour mixture and stir just enough to moisten the dry ingredients. Do not beat.

Turn into greased loaf pan and bake in moderate oven, 350 F., about 1 hour.
