Watch for Banded Birds

a miniature sanctuary on his farm or residence by feeding the birds the year round and by placing nesting boxes for their comfort. It has been exceedingly gratifying to note the increase in birds where this protection has been afforded.

"In bird banding we see the dawn of a new era in ornithology and much is about to be accomplished that has long been desired. We sincerely urge all those interested in birds to watch for banded birds and report at once to the game warden or to the Bureau of Biological Survey at Washington, D.C., the band number and all the details.

"The New England Bird Banding Association stands ready through its secretary, Mr. L. B. Fletcher, 73 Water street, Boston, to furnish to those interested all the available data for the beginner and to assist in any way possible those who are sincerely interested in this movement."

Best results in bird study are obtained, according to Charles L. Whittle of Cambridge, one of the councilors of the association, by organizing a regional association of bird banders, meeting by the bringing together a membership from an area possessing one or more migration highways, along which trapping stations could be established to furnish, by intensive attack, fairly speedy answers to certain specific migration problems thus early demonstrating to members the scientific value of bird banding with the consequent stimulus to continue the work which it is expected will ultimately solve more ornithological riddles, aid in the solution of others and create new problems not now anticipated.

Sunday School Lesson

JESUS, THE GREAT PHYSICIAN.

Lesson—Luke 4: 31-5:39 Printed Text—Luke 5: 17-26. Golden Text—"Himself took our infirmities, and bare our diseases." Matt 8:17.

Historical Setting

Time—A.D. 28, Ptolemais—Capernaum Introduction—Following the baptism and temptation of Jesus and the wedding in Cana of Galilee, Jesus spent several months in what is called his first great Judean ministry. This is supposed to have covered the summer and autumn of A.D. 27. In December He returned to Galilee by way of Samaria, at which time the conversion of the Samaritan women took place at Jacob's well (John 4:42). In March, A.D. 28, He returned to Jerusalem to the Passover and in April returned to Galilee which marks the beginning of the great Galilean ministry. After His rejection at Nazareth He went to Capernaum preaching and teaching through the summer and autumn in and around Capernaum and the country bordering the Sea of Galilee. The incidents covered in this lesson assignment occurred in May and June of this period.

Comments.

Verse 17. The Pharisees were the strict conformists, not only to law, but also to their own traditions. At this period in Christ's ministry they were seeking to inform themselves concerning Him and His teachings. We are not to infer from the last sentence that Christ's power to heal was intermittent.

Verse 18. Mark tells us that there were four men in the company who carried the paralytic. Jesus was teaching in the house.

Verse 19. A dense crowd was about the door and probably in the court. These men did not abandon their worthy errand because the usual way was not open. While they showed boldness and initiative the tiles could be replaced. After the roof was opened, the mattress was let down to the very feet of Jesus.

Verse 20. We must believe that the faith referred to was in the heart of the sick man as well as of his friends. Whether or not the man was the victim of his own sins, Jesus attended to his greatest need first.

Verse 21. In truth there was no neutral ground concerning Christ. He was either claimed to be God or He was guilty of blasphemy. There is no consistent ground for one who would pay tribute to Christ, and, at the same time, rob Him of His divinity.

Verse 22. Undoubtedly these faultfinders were telling themselves as that it was easier for Him to say that He had forgiven the man's sins than for Him to deal with the man's bodily affliction, since the latter needed visible proof.

Verse 24. Here is one of the Golden Texts of the Bible: Christ has power to forgive sins. We are not to understand that the healing of the paralytic was for the sole benefit of the Pharisees. The miracle was used to confound them in their conclusions.

Verse 25. This was not partial recovery. The man was not only able to rise, but was also able to assume the burden of his bed. It is important to note that he glorified God.

Verse 26. The mingled amazement and fear of those who witnessed the miracle can be imagined. What they had witnessed must have caused the words to which they had listened to make a deep impression on their minds.

Practical Teachings.—We should bring our friends in the arms of faith to Jesus, and bring them just as they are. Let no one drop his corner of the blanket; the paralyzed cases will never be healed if you fall. It is infinitely better to be one of the tolling four than one of the growing screech. A religion that does not assure us of forgiveness of sin is a vain religion. Faith is the natural and necessary condition of salvation. Miracles were the seals of the divine authority of Jesus, the proofs that His message of love was from God. Jesus Christ is living now, and is doing through His people and the effects of His gospel in the world, the same kind of works He did then, with the same object and value.

Think Mrs. Gibson's Story Will Stand Examination

NEW BRUNSWICK, N.J., Nov. 2.—Maintaining that he felt confident that the eye witness story told by Mrs. Jane Gibson would "stand up," special Deputy Attorney General Mott continued today his efforts to identify the man Mrs. Gibson described as being the murderer of the Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall and Mrs. Eleanor Mills.

According to Mrs. Gibson, witnesses have been found to corroborate her statement that a woman wearing a long grey coat, was on the Phillips farm on the night of the murder. Two sisters of the murdered clergyman, Mrs. Paul Bonner, of New York and Mrs. Frank Voorhees, of Jersey City, told newspaper men that their knowledge of the circumstances made them believe implicitly in the innocence of the rector's widow. It was Mrs. Voorhees' ten-year old daughter, Frances, who was in the Hall home on the night of the murder and who says that Mrs. Hall was at home that night at least until nine o'clock. Detective James F. Mason, chief investigator for Mr. Mott, coincided with his chief's views, declaring he has "every confidence in Mrs. Gibson's story of the murder and believes it will stand the strictest examination."

Has a Fighting Chance for Life

HALIFAX, N.S., Nov. 2.—Leslie R. Corkum, Spring Garden Road grocer, who was last night shot down as he stood behind the counter of his store, by a lone robber, who got away with about \$30, is lying in the Victoria General Hospital with what the doctors term "a fighting chance for life."

Meanwhile the identity of his assailant is wrapped in obscurity. The three people who claim to have seen the handit, all give conflicting descriptions and the police are apparently baffled. No arrests have been made, although all available officers and detectives were scattered about the city an hour after the crime was committed. This morning the father and brother of the wounded man arrived in the city and were at the hospital where he was operated upon. The bullet lodged in the testis and has not been removed. Mr. Corkum is twenty-six years old and unmarried.

HALIFAX, Nov. 2.—Roland Finlay of Yarmouth was arrested here last night by Detective Hrace Kennedy in connection with the shooting Tuesday night of Leslie Corkum, Spring Garden Road grocer. Finlay was apprehended on Market st. and taken into custody. When found he was carrying a fully loaded revolver and answered in a general way to the description of the shooter of Corkum. Corkum's condition remained critical all day. An operation was performed yesterday morning but the bullet which entered the abdomen was not removed. His condition last night however, was reported to be considerably improved.
