—KENSINGTON.—A very interesting meeting of the Kensington League was held in the Temperance Hall on Monday evening, August 25th. The subject of the meeting was a temperance address by Rev. W. D. Wilson, Field Secretary, of the Provincial Temperance Alliance. There was not as large a number present as might have been, but those who were present went away with more courage for the fight against Intemperance; went away inspired by the cheering and hopeful words of the man who is new at the head of the Temperance forces. The meeting opened at 8 o'clock with the vice-president Mr. George Brown, in the chair. In a neat speech Mr. Brown welcomed Mr. Wilson to Kensington and called upon him to address the meeting. One thing that impressed the writer while at the meeting was Mr. Wilson's fearlessness. He has the courage, of his convictions, and is by no means afraid to speak against wrong of whatever form it may be. He began his speech by asking those present how they regarded the evil of Intemperance. Some regard it as a sin, some as a vice, others as a crime, and still, others as a disease. After citing numerous instances of the devastations of this great evil, and tel-

ling of his work in other places especially where he was last located as a minister, he stated that he was at present on the statute books a good law, the present Prohibition Law. There are loop-holes to be sure, but bona-fide evidence, acted upon in time, can not fail to get a conviction. In closing he said that the battle can not be fought to a successful issue without the help of religion. Any effort without reference to religion is useless. He cited the case of a man who ran as a temperance candidate in the U. S. presidential election. This man said in his campaign speeches that the temperance work was to be carried on entirely without reference to religion and some years afterwards he died in a poor-house, his very clothes having been given to him by Christian Charity. Rev. G. A. Sutherland followed Mr. Wilson and in a forceful speech set forth the work of the Alliance, of which he is president. He declared that the appointment of a Field Secretary was in the nature of an experiment, to see if public opinion was really in favor of temperance, and to see how the movement would be supported financially. It will be remembered that at one of its meetings last winter the League pledged itself to raise \$100 for the support of a Field Secretary. The following committee was appointed to collect same; Messrs W. Bentley, A. Thompson, J. F. Proffitt, Dr. Darrach, Harold Leard, W. Walker and Mrs. George Brown. After remarks by Dr. Darrach, Dr. Houston, Mr. J. F. Proffitt, Mr. Metherell and others, the meeting was brought to an end by singing the national anthem.—K.
