Central Guardian In Memoriam ALEXANDER NICHOLSON

The community of Mt. Buchanan was deeply grieved when on the morning of Saturday, August 17th, 1929 they learned that one of their best loved citizens in the person of Alexander Nicholson, dearly beloved son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Nicholson had passed away.

Although not unexpected, his death at the early age of twenty-eight years and eleven months came as a great shock to his many friends and relatives.

Alex, as he was familiarly called, since his early boyhood enjoyed to an unusual extent the love and esteem of both young and old.

Being a young man of more than ordinary intelligence, and possessing an open hearted and kindly disposition, he never failed to win the friendship and admiration of all with whom he came in contact.

With his chums, at work or play, or in his home none can ever remember an angry word or unkind deed.

Always patient and kind with the little children, generous and fair with his comrades, and sympathetic and understanding with the aged, he was looked upon by all as a true and loyal friend.

He will be sadly missed by all in the community, but in his home, where the influence of his beautiful character was daily felt there will be a deep void that can never be filled.

While still a youth he left his home to satisfy the natural aspirations of an active mind and brain, to make his mark in the world.

His health gave away, and in the fall of 1928 he was compelled to return to his home.

Perhaps at no time in his life were the sterling qualities of heart and mind so manifest as during his long and weary illness.

From his devoted parents and brother and sister he received every attention that loving hearts could bestow; their care though, his welfare, but despite the best of medical attention and the tender nursing of a kind and loving mother, death slowly but surely won the grim battle.

On Saturday morning he called his loved ones to his bedside and calmly informing them that the struggle was over. With the name of the Saviour whom he loved so dearly on his lips and a smile of peace and contentment on his face he peacefully breathed his last.

The funeral, conducted by his pastor, Rev. Mr. Roger of Belfast Presbyterian Church, was held from his home on Tuesday, Aug. 20th. The very large concourse of people from far and near who followed all that was moral of a dear friend to its last resting place, bore mute testimony to his wide-spread popularity.

In a grave on a sunny slope in the little cemetery at Mt. Buchanan close by the school house where as a little boy he romped with his play-mates, they tenderly laid him, there to await that glorious morning "when the day breaks and the shadows flee away."

Besides his sorrowing parents, he leaves to mourn one brother, John, and sister, Isabel to whom the sympathy of the whole community is extended.
