THE RULE OF THE ROAD

Sir: I was glad to see in your columns this morning that so well known and experienced a writer as Mr. McCready has taken up the question of the change in passing from the left to the right.

There is absolutely no reason for any change which in itself would be attended with inconvenience, for some time; one half the people would go to the left while others would go to the right and be the cause of accidents. The advantage of passing to the left is, as Mr. McCready says, that both drivers can see exactly how close their vehicles are in passing. This is a decided advantage in winter when there is only one track and it is necessary in passing that the sleighs should almost touch to avoid putting the horse into the deep snow which might cause cutting.
