THE CANADIAN ARMY CALLS FOR MEN

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

OTTAWA.—The prime minister has received the following cable from General Sir Arthur Currie, in response to Sir Robert Borden's message of congratulation sent last week in General Currie's assumption of the command of the Canadian army corps.

"I sincerely appreciate and am deeply grateful for the kind message of congratulation from yourself and colleagues. My pride in commanding the Canadian corps is surpassed only by my determination to serve it in such a manner as will ensure its splendid reputation being maintained, and as will merit the approval of my countrymen. I note with special gratification your assurance that the troops in the field can rely upon Canada giving them all necessary support. They have given their blood freely to maintain their nation's honor, and now confidently expect that the full fruits of their sacrifice will not be prejudiced. It is an imperative and urgent necessity that steps be immediately taken to ensure that sufficient drafts of officers and men are sent from Canada to keep the corps at its full strength."

TEUTONS LOSING MUNITIONS PLANTS

PARIS.—Several disasters have recently occurred in munition plants in Germany, according to the Zurich correspondent of the Matin.

The correspondent telegraphs that he has learned from private German sources that the hand grenade arsenal at Spandau exploded on June 16 and that seven ammunition shops at Marienhal were destroyed by fire on the 18th. Some ammunition factories at Nuremberg also have been burned down, according to this authority.

Spandau is nine miles west of Berlin. Large government munition works are there. Nuremberg, rich in historic traditions, is more noted for varied industrial plants than as a munition-making centre. By Marienhal, Marienhal in Saxony may be meant.
