She sailed same night for St. John's, Nfld., via Souris and the Sydney, taking the following cargo: One thousand bags of potatoes, four hundred bags of oats, eight hundred bales of hay, one hundred and twenty tubs and boxes of butter, one hundred and twenty cattle on deck, two horses and fifty sheep.

Most successful membership roll call meetings have been held in each of the appointments on Albert, N. B. circuit, additions being made to the roll in each instance. Recently Rev. W. J. Kirby, the pastor, baptized a young man in the Harvey church, and four young men, eight young women, and one mother of a family were received into the membership of the church.—Wesleyan.—Mr. Kirby was formerly of Grace Church, City.

On Friday afternoon the railway station at Mount Albion was in grave danger of being destroyed by fire, due to the falling of a spark from a passing engine among a large pile of wood lying adjacent to the station. The conflagration became so bad that it was found necessary to send to the city of aid. A working train left about four o'clock and after considerable work those sent out succeeded in extinguishing the flames. Had the wind been blowing in any other direction than it was the station would undoubtedly have been destroyed.

A handsome new pulpit was placed in St. Peter's Cathedral last week, and was used for the first time yesterday. It was designed by W. O. Harris, architect, and is in keeping with the Reredos, Choir Stalls and Wood-screen, and adds very much to the appearance of the church. The body and base of the pulpit are of mahogany oak, with carved panels of mahogany. The cornice and subbase have also carvings in the latter wood. On one of the lower panels is a brass tablet, bearing the following inscription: "To the Glory of God and the Loving Memory of Marion Campbell Simpson, 1821-1907, Jesus Mercy." The pulpit is the gift of Miss Jessie Simpson, and was made in the workshop of George Gaudin, the woodwork being executed by Chas. E. Carson, and the carving by Wm. Whitlock. The Sanctuary of the Memorial Chapel has also received further adornment. Last year the seven niches above the altar were filled with statues of the Apostles, with our Lord preaching as the central figure in memory of Fred. C. and Mrs. Brecken. Now the remaining niches on the right and left of the altar have been fitted and are as follows: St. Matthew, late Rector of Three Rivers, P. Q.; St. John and St. Jude, in memory of Henry F. and Rufus P. Chard; James the Less, in memory of the children of Robt. Hogg; St. Andrew in memory of Andrew Bordon Mitchell; St. James the Great in memory of the children of Mrs. James Peake; St. Thomas in memory of Thomas H. and Mrs. Haviland; St. Simon in memory of Robt. Haviland and Mrs. Sydney Fitzgerald. Under each figure is small brass tablet bearing the name of the person commemorated. A large figure of St. Peter has also been placed in the niche on the right hand side of the porch, completing the decorations of this part of the building. The work upon the chapel is nearing completion, and without doubt the interior will be the most beautiful of its kind in Canada. Every day from 7 a. m. to 6 p. m. the building is open and a visit is well worth while.

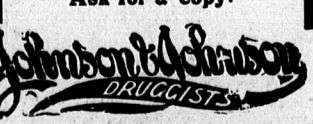

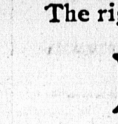
