ALIEN LABOR ACT AMENDED

More Stringent Provisions but with Exceptions

TO AMEND THE LABOR ACT.

OTTAWA, July 29 (Special)—A Bill was introduced into Parliament today by Sir William Mulock to amend the Alien Labor Act, making it an offence to import persons under promise or offer of employment.

Provision is made to give employers power to import labor when it cannot be procured in Canada.

THE MURDER OF VON PLEHVE IS

The Removal of a Great Personality in Russia

Suspicion that the Deed may be Part of an Extended Plot, Aimed at the Emperor as well.

A GREAT PERSONALITY TAKEN.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 29 (Special)—All the newspapers today agree that in the assassination of Von Plehve a great personality has been taken off in the midst of his work.

AN IRREPARABLE LOSS.

The Official Messenger says that his death is an irreparable loss to all patriotic Russians.

TWENTY BYSTANDERS INJURED.

Nothing has yet been discovered of the antecedents of Lego, the assassin. Twenty bystanders were injured by the explosion of the bomb but only seven of them were seriously hurt.

THE NAME OF THE ASSASSIN.

The Bourse Gazette gives the name of the assassin as Prozes but this is not confirmed by the police.

MAY BE A GENERAL PLOT.

The general public are disposed to regard the criminal as intimately connected with the terrorist movement revealed last summer by the arrest of Gersburtr, who tried to organize a plot to kill the Emperor.

ICEBERGS UNUSUALLY BIG.

ST. JOHN WILL NOT CHALLENGE

They Think it would be a Useless Task

To Attempt to Beat the Cibou, now Holder of the Coronation Cup—Ch'town more Sanguine.

THE R. K. Y. C. have decided not to send a boat to Sydney this year to compete for the coronation cup donated to the R. K. Y. C. two years ago by Robt. Thompson. After the defeat last year of the Ganouin that was purchased by Mr. Ganouin of Fernie and taken to Sydney and raced by a St. John crew against the Cibou, the present holder of the cup, the club has deemed it inadvisable to send another boat for the August race. This means there will be no competitor there from St. John this year. Charlottetown will compete.

On Saturday, July 30th, the race for the Ruel shield and club prizes, open to class "A" yachts, will come off in Grand Bay, beginning at 2.30 p. m. The time limit is 2 1/2 hours. The officers of the day will be Edgar Fairweather and Horace King. Entries for the race will close on Friday evening. The race will be sailed over the "C" course, starting off club wharf, thence through the northeast channel to a buoy in front of Bluff Rock, Brandy Point, two hundred feet from the shore, almost in a direct line from Brown's house, thence southeast to a buoy off mill, centre of Clarke's Cove, South Bay, leaving these marks on port hand and Indian Island on starboard hand and finishing off club wharf. The length of the course is 10 miles.

The Ruel shield under the deed of gift must be raced for 11 times, the winner of the greatest number of races to become the owner of the trophy. Already six of these races have been sailed and all have been won by the Canada, which yacht is virtually the owner of the cup, but will not come into possession until the series is finished. In addition to the Ruel shield there will be first, second and third prizes of \$8, \$6, and \$4.
