REV. W. D. WILSON AT THE BAPTIST CHURCH.

"WHOSE IMAGE AND SUPERSCRIPTION?"

RUSSIA MAKING BIG SACRIFICES.

LONDON, Dec. 12.—Telegraphing from Petrograd says: "How great are the financial sacrifices Russia is making to promote temperance among her people, at a time when money is sorely needed for war purposes, is disclosed by the latest official statistics concerning the spirit monopoly.

OTTAWA, Dec. 12.—An Order-in-council has been passed by the Government which will be welcomed not only by thousands of civil servants throughout the Dominion but by the store keepers striving to do a brisk Christmas trade.

WILL PAY CIVIL SERVANTS BEFORE CHRISTMAS.

By this order in council all permanent employees in the outside civil service and all temporary employees in both inside and outside service of the Government will be given their salaries for the month of December on the 22nd inst, instead of at the end of the month as usual.

MODIFY PEACE CELEBRATION PLAN.

OTTAWA, Dec. 12.—His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, was present Wednesday at a meeting of the executive of the Canadian Peace Centenary Association, which was also attended by eight members of the Commission appointed by the State of New York for the purpose of arranging a suitable celebration by the Province of Ontario and the State of New York of the 100 years of peace.

QUEBEC TO NEW YORK HIGHWAY

It was also decided that, if practicable, steps should be taken for the formal opening of the Quebec to New York highway next summer and that ceremonies should be held at the boundary where this highway crosses the frontier.

LONE LIGHT KEEPER STILL ON LAKE DUTY.

OTTAWA, Dec. 12.—Navigation on the Great Lakes and St Lawrence is now practically closed. One lone light keeper is still on duty on Lake Superior. He is on Pariseau Island, near Sault Ste. Marie, and will be taken off within a day or two.

BRITAIN AND PORTUGAL SIGN ANOTHER TREATY.

LONDON, Dec. 12.—An arbitration treaty between Great Britain and Portugal has been signed in London. The treaty, which is for a period of five years, is of special significance at the present moment, as is emphasized in the preamble in the following words:

"Being desirous of confirming by a further solemn agreement the friendship alliance which happily has subsisted for so long a period between them, and of eliminating so far as is possible from their relations everything which might impair or weaken that friendship, the alliance has agreed to the submission of questions in dispute in the terms of the articles of this treaty."
