WILL OF LATE T. HANDRAHAN

The will of the late Thomas Handrahan was probated Monday. Under it F. L. Haszard and George William Handrahan are executors and trustees. To them the whole of the estate is transferred in trust. The dwelling house on Rochford Square is to be held for the use of Mrs. Handrahan during her life, together with an annuity of \$500. To Miss Josephine Handrahan \$6,000 is given for her own sole use and benefit, to his son George William the sum of \$4,000 and to Dennis O'Mera Handrahan \$3,000. For Thomas P. and Ralph B. Handrahan \$1,000 each is to be set apart, to be held by the executors and paid as they see fit. To his sister, Margaret Murphy, the annuity of \$250 is given for life, to be paid in monthly instalments. To the Bishop of Charlottetown there is given a general church purposes the sum of \$300. Two thousand dollars is to be paid for the education of the children of the late Dr. James Handrahan, \$100 to the Charlottetown Hospital, and \$100 to the St. Vincent de Paul Society. The estate remaining on the death of his wife is bequeathed to his son George William and Dennis O'Mera and his daughter Mary Josephine in equal shares. In conclusion, the testator expresses the wish that his sons George William and Dennis O'Mera, and his two clerks, Eadley V. Dunstan and John E. Bell, shall, if practicable, buy out the business and wharf property and continue the business. In the meantime, the business is to be continued by the trustees for one year after the testator's death. The inventory has not yet been filed.

...Dealers in Montague yesterday were paying forty-two cents a bus for oats; twenty-two to twenty-five cents a doz for eggs; ten dollars a ton for loose hay; ten and a quarter cents a lb for pork; twenty-two cts a lb for butter and twenty-two cts a doz for eggs.

...Dealers in Souris yesterday were paying twenty-five cents a lb for butter forty cents a bus for oats; twenty-eight cents a bus for potatoes; ten and a half cents a lb for inspected pork; sixteen cents a lb for turnips; nine and one half cents a pound for hides; twenty-five cents a doz for eggs; one dollar each for pelts, ten dollars a ton for hay and five dollars a ton for straw.

the New York State league and led the Albany pitchers with 22 won, 11 lost and one tie. Wolfgang, May 19, 1909, held Syracuse to no hits, but lost the game, 1 to 0. Last year he gave 46 bases on balls in 40 games; he struck out 90 men, hit but one man, had one wild pitch and one balk, which indicate clearly his excellent control. He had eight extra-inning games last year, one of which, a 9 to 0 game, went to 14 innings. He lost only three of the extended games. Wolfgang is essentially a spit-ball pitcher. He also uses an effective drop, but his curves are slight.

...The Scotch concert, under the auspices of St. Andrew's Church choir, which was postponed, will take place on Thursday, Feb. 10th, in the Auditorium, Montague, at 7.30 p. m. 2-5dtf.

...Prof. Theodore Ross addressed a meeting of the Onward Farmers' Institute in the Temperance Hall, Georgetown, on Feb. 4th. Mr. Ross spoke on a variety of subjects. He complimented the institute on the work done during the past year and on their efforts in arranging for the coming Seed Fair. He showed that by the formation of a Central Institute, where delegates from all the institutes could meet, legislation and education could be influenced and better prices obtained for farm produce. Mr. Ross also spoke of the information gained by those who attended the short course at Truro. The dairy industry was also touched on and better training along the line of feeding and care of cattle was advocated. The education question was next dealt with and the necessity was shown of more education along agricultural lines. The professor alluded to the rotation of crops, snowing that to use the elements of plant food in the soil most economically a proper rotation should be followed. The following was recommended: 1st year, pasture; 2nd year, hold crop; 3rd year, wheat or barley; 4th year, clover; 5th year, oats; 6th year, timothy hay. In preparing the land for hold crop, ribbing up the land in the fall was advocated. Prof. Ross was listened to with great attention and questions asked by members present were answered satisfactorily. At the close a vote of thanks was tendered the professor, which was suitably acknowledged. J. V. McPhee, Secretary.

THE END OF THE ALASKAN BOUNDARY DISPUTE.

Popular interest in the Alaskan Boundary Dispute did not soon after the decision of the International Tribunal, when Lord Alverstone made his so-called concession to the Americans. But the most important work of all in connection with the boundary has been proceeding quietly ever since. The actual marking of the line has been going on. And how is the boundary being marked? This question is answered in entertaining fashion in February Busy Man's by one of the members of the Canadian boundary survey party, J. D. Craig, D.L.S.

The line is "marked" in three ways—by monuments, by cutting out the "vista," and by ascertaining the exact position of each of its turning points or angles. The monuments are placed on the line at all prominent points, such as the banks of rivers, the crossing of trails, or on the summits of ridges or mountain spurs on line. These monuments are of aluminum bronze, and two sides are used. For the more important points a large one, weighing about two hundred and seventy-five pounds, five feet high, square in section, hollow, and tapering toward the top, is set in concrete, the whole weighing from twenty-five hundred to thirty-five hundred pounds. For the minor or less accessible points a more portable monument, weighing about fifty-five pounds, is used. It is of the same material, a hollow cone three feet high, with four legs, which are either cemented into holes drilled in the solid rock or set in a bed of concrete. A "twenty-foot sky-line," or vista, is cut through all timber along the line. All trees, or branches of trees, within ten feet of the line on either side, are cut down, and as it is generally easier to cut down a whole tree than to climb it to cut off some overhanging branch, many trees are felled which are, outside the ten-foot limit. This gash in the timber is very noticeable and remains prominently visible for many years. The latitude, longitude, and altitude of all turning points on the line, and also of all monuments, are ascertained by connecting them by a system of triangulation, with points, the positions of which have already been determined. At the same time data are obtained from which are constructed accurate maps, showing the topography of the country for two miles on each side of the line.

Synopsis of Canadian North west Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00. W. W. CORY, Deputy of the Minister of the Interior N.
