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matter of no certainty. That so strong an opposition promptly developed among the leading newspaper organs of the party may well cause hesitation even if Sir Wilfrid and his colleagues were most desirous of giving the Provincial Premiers what they demand.

It is pretty generally understood that the pressure for increased subsidies is strongest from the Province of Quebec, which is in rather a bad way financially. Moreover, Premier Parent, who is a very strong man and appears to have made an honest effort since he came to power to restore the equilibrium between receipts and expenditures in his Province, is not a man to be lightly brushed aside. Sir Wilfrid, having lost Mr. Tarte, must naturally desire to retain the support of Mr. Parent, and the latter is duly conscious of the power which the situation gives him. It would be regrettable if the hand of the Federal Government should be moved to disturb the financial basis of the federation against their own better judgment and that of so large a contingent of the journals supporting them. We conclude that under the circumstances there will at least be some considerable delay before the recommendations of the Premiers are concurred in.

Was Lady Macbeth a Study of Queen Elizabeth?

To the "Dublin Review" the Rev. Vincent J. McNabb contributes a well-thought-out and most interesting argument as to whether or not Shakespeare wrote "Macbeth" prompted by a desire to show a parallel to Queen Elizabeth's treatment of Mary Stuart, Queen of Scotland, to the astringent audiences of James I's reign. After quoting evidence to prove that Shakespeare was in the habit of holding the mirror up to nature in his plays, the writer brings forward the friendship of the poet with the Earl of Southampton, an ardent friend to Mary, who was thrown into prison by Elizabeth and released by James, as an argument to prove that Shakespeare had cause for a dislike of Queen Elizabeth. And further:

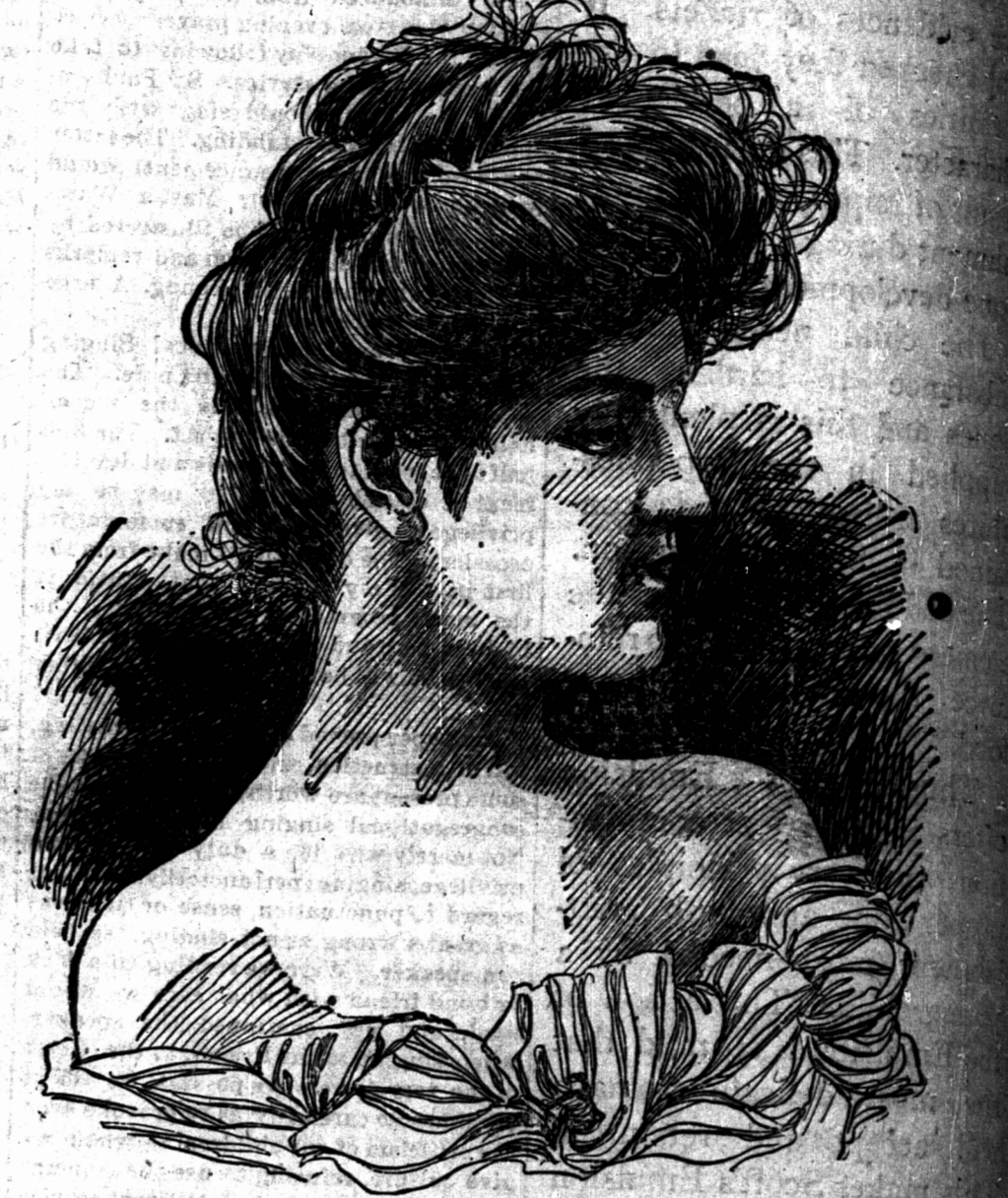
"According to Malone and other competent critics, 'Macbeth' could not have been written earlier than 1606, three years after the coronation of James, the son of Mary Queen of Scots. Evidently the play had been recognized as suitable to the circumstances of his nationality and history. Thus we find the king's visit to Oxford in 1603 marked by a play, or interlude, called 'Macbeth,' performed in the king's presence."

The writer gives six points of resemblance between the play and historical events. Of these the following are the most telling:

"It is the only play of which Shakespeare lays the plot in Scotland. This could hardly fail to please a Scottish king; and we have seen that this fitness with circumstances had already been recognized by the University authorities at Oxford. The play is based on the murder of a kinsman, sovereign, and guest. Mary Stuart was kinswoman, queen (in the eyes of her adherents), and guest of Elizabeth. The outcome of the 'vaulting ambition' which overleaps itself is that the sovereignty passes from Macbeth to the son of the murdered sovereign; just as the crown of England passed on Elizabeth's death to James, the son of Mary. And we may remark that Shakespeare has made many additions to the source of the play, Holinshed's Chronicle. The whole character of Lady Macbeth is the poet's own creation."

As the writer very truly remarks, these are strong arguments in favor of the idea he brings forward, and we must also remember that points which seem obscure now would appear very differently to audiences familiar with the gossip of the day.

THE PROPOSED NEW SUBSIDIES.

When the proposed increase of the per capita subsidies was resolved upon by the Conference of Premiers at Ottawa our mail communications with the mainland were cut off and newspaper writers on the Island were for the time deprived of the advantage of such opinions as had been expressed by the journals of the larger cities. In taking exception to the proposal The Guardian was quite unaware of how it would strike the minds of other organs of public opinion. Now we know that a number of the leading Liberal newspapers have received the new proposal either with doubt of their expediency or with downright disfavor.

The Montreal Witness offers direct and uncompromising opposition to the proposed increase of subsidies. The Montreal Herald has no favor for it. La Patrie, Mr Tarte's organ, treats it as a serious and almost an alarming proposition, which if carried into effect would virtually increase the public debt of the Dominion by \$60,000,000. The Toronto Globe, while not directly condemning the increase, (which it could not very well do as a close supporter of Premier Ross) points out that the effect will necessarily be an increase of taxation. The Toronto Star gives it a cool reception while the Hamilton Times and the Ottawa Free Press are distinctly hostile.

Collectively the journals have named are representative of the intelligence of the Liberal party in the two larger Provinces. That they should so unitedly view with distrust and most of them with positive opposition the proposals put forward by the Liberal Premiers is of itself remarkable. That they should do so in face of the fact that it is the larger Provinces rather than the smaller ones which will profit, most by the change should it be carried out is equally so. What the Ottawa [Government will do is as yet a

We think it will be difficult for most readers of The Patriot to make out what the writer of the article on Independence is driving at. What is "Utopian smoke," for instance? And why should it be impossible for a parliament of independents to elect their own officers? Surely there is nothing in the principle of independence to prevent the majority bearing rule. The entire article is a specimen of false and forced conclusions drawn from premises which are in some cases absurd. It would be a waste of time and energy to attempt an answer.

Many ocean steamers are now equipped with the Marconi apparatus and so are able to keep up communication with the port which they are leaving long after disappearing from view, and with their port of destination long before they have reached it, as well as to speak with other vessels similarly equipped who may come within their radius of communication while still out of sight. The advantages are so great and so obvious that we are led to hope the Government will equip our winter steamers in the same way. While the Stanley has been adrift for a month and much of the time lost to sight it would have seen of great satisfaction and utility had she been able to communicate with the Mintop and with a wireless station in Charlottetown.
