

HECTOR OFFERS

Another Inducement to Mr. Mellish to Meet Him

REFERRING to the proposed meeting of Rev. J. H. Hector and Mr. Mellish, the latter having insisted upon the employment of a stenographer, The Guardian is authorized to say that Mr. Hector accepts this proposition provided that he is informed through the press not later than Monday afternoon that Mr. Mellish still desires to meet him, and that the official stenographer only shall be employed to make the report.

THE Summerside Pioneer with commendable honesty repudiates the criticism of the Journal in a recent hockey match. It says: It is, we think, unfortunate that the little squabbles which arise between rival hockey teams should find their way into the press. Charges of partiality and unjust rulings should be decided by the teams interested who have an opportunity of protesting on the spot if any injustice occurs. The recent match between the Crystal Pioneers and the Victorias at Charlottetown may or may not have been unjustly decided but neither the issue of justice nor of hockey can be benefited by accusing either team or their umpires of unsportsmanlike conduct through the newspapers. The boys may be trusted to settle their own disputes and we have no doubt will arrive at a satisfactory conclusion much more quickly without outside interference. They can at least agree to disagree and refuse further playing when injustice is persisted in— if such a condition arises, but it is unfair to parade their disputes before the public. Let the boys play and fight it out among themselves.

A BOSTON exchange contains the following regarding the recent marriage of Charles S. and Mrs. McDonald, the former of Halifax and the latter of Yarmouth River. "I had occasion to run down to Atlaboro recently and was highly amused by an incident, common to the New England town, but seldom seen in the heart of a big city, like our own. As the 8:30 train for Boston pulled into the station there was a tooting of horns, chorus of yells and shouts, a shower of rice and old shoes and a newly married couple were ushered to their car. There was the usual number of final witty remarks, kisses for the blushing fair, one and hand shakes for the happy hubby, and the last of the funmakers left the now rapidly moving train. Ten minutes had elapsed and the next station had been reached, however, before the newly-mated pair discovered dangling from the rack above their heads a big placard with inky characters, plainly reading: "ANNIE AND CHARLEY JUST MARRIED."

The other passengers smiled, the happy pair frowned, and the train moved on.

THREE American young women, Misses Molniss, Perkins and McKay of Boston and vicinity proved themselves heroines on Monday in the hazardous journey of eighteen miles from the ice-imprisoned Steamer Minto running between the Nova Scotia mainland and the Province of Prince Edward Island. Two of the young women had been summoned home to minister to the wants of dying parents and when the steamer with her 40 passengers became fast in the grinding ice they showed great anxiety to reach their destination. A party was organized and three young women and four men left the steamer. In the journey to Pictou Island and thence to the mainland, great hardships were experienced as the ice was in a state of great upheaval, and the sun's rays proved almost blinding; some of the men sinking from exhaustion were actually dragged along by their friends. The women bore up with indomitable spirits, reaching their destination at Pictou at 9 o'clock in the evening, proceeding thence to their homes by another mode of transportation.
