Canadian Teachers Federation Convention

The C.T.F. began its twenty-fourth Annual Conference in the Hotel Vancouver, Vancouver, B.C. on August 13, 1946.

Present were some thirty delegates, representing all the provincial federations of teachers except two Quebec bodies. It might be said here that one of these Quebec bodies this year asked for affiliation with the C.T.F. and such request was granted.

P.E.I. was represented by the following delegates: Miss Estelle Bonness Summerside, President of the P.E.I. T.F.; Daniel MacDonald, St. Peter's, Vice-Pres. of the P.E.I. T.F.; and J.A.S. Williams, B.A. of Charlottetown, Pres. of the City Teachers' Institute and Member of the Executive of the P.E.I. T.F.

The business of the Convention was interspersed by various social functions, sponsored by the B.C. T.F., and the B.C. Dept. of Education.

The following was the main business dealt with: Pres. Willoughby's Report; Gen. Secy Crutchfield's Report; Discussion of all provincial reports sent in by the various General Bodies by B.C. T.F.; Items made up this report. Such matters as Organization, Superannuation, Tenure, Teaching Conditions, Legislative Enactments, Curriculum Changes, Larger Units, and Statutory Membership were dealt with.

Supernumeration by Sask Teachers' Federation; Salaries by B.C. T.F.; Financing Education by Alta T. Assoc.

Canadian Plans for Health Improvement by Prov. Assoc. of Prot. Teachers of Quebec; Teachers Training by Ont. T.F.; Canadian Council for Educational Research by Dr. M.E. LaZerte; Education Week by B.C. T.F.; Canadian Association for Adult Education by E.K. Marshall; National Advisory Council on School Broadcasting by W.B. Adams and Dr. Crutchfield; World Federation of Education Association by Dr. Hardy.
