Storey And Sparks Both Predicting Victory In Tonight's Main Event

After weeks of preparation the main event of the 1938 boxing season at the Forum tonight will be the fight between Storey and Sparks. Storey, making his first appearance in an Island ring and preceded by a build-up that really ranks him as a really true shadow of the prize ring in every sense, arrived on the Island yesterday and last night as we watched him to through his paces could not fail to see the marvellous way he handles himself inside that squared circle. As slippery as an eel, elusive as a shadow, Storey looked to be in perfect shape as he breezed through three rounds of shadow boxing and then went three rounds with Stan Biggar, Island heavyweight champion. At the end he wasn't drawing a fast breath and as he unclashed his weapons of war he was quite confident of winning tonight's fray. Boasting a marvellous physique the Waterville battler is never out of condition and only last week he shaked up two additional victories to his string, both by the easy route in winning bouts at Rockland and Waterville, Maine.

Sparks, the other principal in the main event, arrived in the city last evening and like his opponent looked and acted to be in perfect condition. Down to around 166 pounds the Amherst boy, ever popular on every appearance here, was fully confident of taking tonight's battle. He knows full well the

type of fighter he is up against—one of the best middleweights in the game today—but not the least bit daunted he promises to go into the battle pit tonight seeking to end the fray just as quickly as possible and he feels too that he is able to do just that, something no other fighter has ever been able to do.

Odds favored Storey last night, and it was probable that he would enter the ring a big favorite, but Sparks' backers, and there are plenty of them, are willing to lay it on the line that the Maritime Province leather pusher will be returned the winner tonight.

BINNS TO FIGHT TONIGHT

Owing to an injury suffered in training a few days ago word got around the city that Bennie Binns would not be seen in action on tonight's card against Reg Harper of Amherst. That, however, proved to be just another rumour, Binnie, according to the promoter, will be in there slinging punches tonight and as usual giving the fans a run for their money.

This semi-final could well be billed as a main event. In any fight the writer has yet seen Bennie perform he has always given of his best and has always provided action from start to finish and tonight's battle will prove no exception. As long as the semi-final lasts the fans will have plenty to enthuse over.

A well-matched card of preliminaries round out one of the finest cards ever attempted here and the advance ticket sale promises a bumper house for tonight's fray.

And don't make any mistake about his punching prowess. When Storey's right opening presents itself this boy can really lay the leather on in a manner that will set the best of them dizzy.

Sparks in the finest condition of his career will be up against the toughest proposition he has ever faced in an Island ring but despite the reputation of the Maine boy has gathered this writer is of the opinion that the Amherstian will give Storey a much closer battle than most fans are predicting.

Watching Sparks in many fights here one could not but be impressed by both his boxing ability and punching prowess. This Sparks is nobody's fool inside that squared circle. A physique matching Storey's, he too is always in shape and fights right according to our way of thinking should be a close thrilling battle all the way.

Waite Hoyt, Heinie Manush Released By The Dodgers

NEW YORK, May 16—Two great names of baseball were scratched from the big league box scores today with Brooklyn's outright release of pitcher Waite Hoyt, the 39-year-old "schoolboy wonder," and slugger Heinie Manush.

For Hoyt, the pink slip meant the apparent end of 18 years in the big show. A decade ago, with the crackles of age about the best in the business, and his decline has been gradual and grudging.

Manush broke into the Detroit outfield 14 years ago, and in only five seasons since did he fall to his over 300. In 1926 he led the American League with a mark of 377, and last year, at the ripe old age of 37, he paced the Dodgers with 338.

Larry MacPhail, new business manager of the Brooklyn, promised some weeks ago there would be a "house-cleaning" if the club didn't show signs of life by May 15 and this was it. At the same time he released the veteran catcher, Roy Spenger, and sent pitcher George Jeffcoat to Kansas City on option.

Hoyt might have hastened his departure by a magazine article he wrote last winter, in which he asserted the American League was stronger than the National.

It created considerable resentment among the National Leaguers and the batters proceeded to pin the veteran's ears back every time they touched the mound this spring. MacPhail, however, said he was influenced by the article and that Hoyt simply didn't have "it" any more.

Upset Features Mar. Candlepin Tournament

HALIFAX, May 16—(CP)—Defeat in the biggest upset of the day, Conn-Martell Alleys, defending champions, came back to forge into the title with Saint John Y. M. C. J. Frederick and Sydney Doseos for leadership in the Maritime-eastern Maine candlepin bowling tournament as the fifth round ended tonight.

Quebec Race Tracks Not To Operate, Claim

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

MONTREAL, May 16—Leo Dandurand, part owner of two Montreal race tracks and an official of the Quebec Racing Association, said today there would be no horse-racing in Quebec province this summer because of increased provincial government taxation on the tracks.

Dandurand said this would apply to Montagu Park track, near Cap-tawa, which is in Quebec Province. He is managing director of the Montreal Jockey Club, and he and Joe Gaurin run the Dorval and Blue Bonnets tracks here. The other courses in the province are Mount Royal and King's Park at Montreal, owned by out-of-town interests.

Dandurand declared he and Gaurin had "arrived" with Tommy Gorman, who runs Connaught Park, during the last few weeks and they had come to the conclusion the tracks could not be operated without a loss under the present taxation setup.
