Bride Is Dead 45 Minutes After Wedding

(By The Associated Press) IRWIN, Pa., Dec. 16—Eileen Ann Simko, 23, and Michael Zvara, 26, waited four years for the war to end so they could wed. They were married Saturday. Forty-five minutes later the bride was dead. Smiling happily, she had walked arm-in-arm with her husband, a discharged soldier, out of the crowded church into a shower of rice. She posed for a picture and then entered a waiting automobile. As she sat down, she suffered a hemorrhage and died.

PRESENTATION

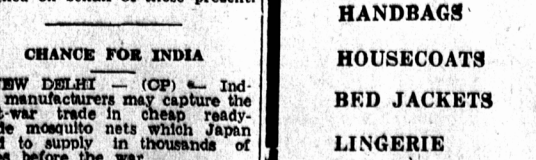
