THE MAIL SPECIAL.—The mail special, which had been in Georgetown during the time the boats were stuck in the ice, arrived in Charlottetown last evening at 4.55 o'clock with mail, express and passengers, from the Bari Grey. The train left again on return to Georgetown last night at 8.45 o'clock.

MEN'S MEETING.—The meeting for men at the Y. M. C. A. tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock, will be another distinctly laymen's meeting and will have as the leader Mr. John T. McKenzie, who will be ably assisted by several local men. All men are invited to come to the meeting and take part. The singing by the audience of male voices will be an inspiring feature.

WELCOME GIFTS.—Received at Falconwood Hospital for the benefit of the patients, two pair of boots and hockey skates from Mr. L. B. McMillan, Secretary Public Works; also one pair hockey skates from Mr. James Rush, one pair hockey skates from Mr. Jas. McInnis, thankfully acknowledged.

ICE RACING MEETING.—The members of the Ice Racing Committee met in the Canada Fox Exchange last evening to decide the dates on which the next ice races would be held, but after due consideration they determined to leave the dates open for the present, or till better weather conditions permit of their being held.

SAD DEATH.—The death occurred at West Royalty on February the 12th of Mrs. Charlotte A. Pickard, wife of Mr. George Pickard of that place. The deceased, who was one of the most highly respected women of the community, was ill only two weeks of paralysis. The funeral took place from her late residence on Saturday, February 14th, at 1.30 p. m., to the Winsloe Cemetery.

FINED \$50 EACH.—At the County Court this morning three of the four men who were charged with having given intoxicating liquor to Indians Rocky Point were convicted by Stipendiary Shaw and fined \$50 or a month's imprisonment without labour. Four Indians gave evidence to the effect that the defendants carried a cask of liquor to the house of them and treated them all to drinks.

COUNCILLOR McKENNA.—Before His Worship Mayor Sterns yesterday morning, Mr. Daniel J. Riley, secretary as Councillor for Ward 2, and Messrs James McDonald, Francis P. McCarron and Charles McGregor took the usual oaths of office as Water Commissioners. The members of the Council and the Water Commissioners are all ex-officio members of the Board of Health of Charlottetown and were accordingly sworn as such. In regard to Ward 1, the position of Mr. John McKenna, who was returned as Councillor for this ward by the casting vote of the Returning Officer on Wednesday, was questioned by Mr. P. A. Statten, a candidate, who rose from his seat in the Council Chamber, on election night and demanded a scrutiny. The Returning Officer replying that he had nothing to do with that. A scrutiny can be obtained by any candidate, but he must demand it in writing addressed to the City Clerk and not to the Returning Officer. Such demand must be made within two days from the date on which the Returning Officer has made his declaration, and between the hours of 10 a. m. and 4 p. m. on the same day by security to pay costs, in the case of a Councillor the security being \$10. Up to 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon no demand for such scrutiny has been made, and Mr. McKenna's position on the Council is thus now undisputed.

HANDKERCHIEF SOCIAL.—A novel sort of a social was held in the K. of C. Hall last evening, beginning at eight o'clock, by the Young People's Aid of the Central Christian Church. It was a handkerchief social, many of which were contributed and they sold rapidly. Ice-cream, cake and coffee were served the numerous visitors to the hall, and proceeds amounting to something like \$50 were got from the affair.

HEMAINS ARRIVE.—The body of the late Margaret E. Beairto, who died in Sydney, N. S., on February the 10th, of pneumonia, arrived in Charlottetown by the mail train last evening. The remains were accompanied by the deceased's brother, Mr. Robert Beairto. They will be forwarded to Summerside by train today for burial. The funeral will take place in Summerside upon the arrival of the morning train from Charlottetown.

VALENTINE TEA.—From five to seven o'clock yesterday the recreation room of the Zion Church was crowded with people who knew well before they got there that the tea would have a delightful tea. The tea was in honor of St. Valentine's Day. At the various tables visitors were served with every kind of dainty and wholesome foods imaginable, salads, cakes, breads, meats, etc., and each and all enjoyed them to the full. It was an arduous success and the many that are now to the credit of the Ladies' Aid of the Church.

OLDER BOYS CONFERENCE.—The first older boys' conference ever held on Prince Edward Island will convene in this city, from Friday evening, March 27th, to Sunday evening 29th. The conference is being promoted by the local Young Men's Christian Association and the Provincial Sunday School Association. It is expected that nearly 200 older boys and men interested in work with boys will come as delegates from churches all over the island. Four men of prominence will come here as speakers at this conference. They are: Messrs. Taylor Statten, Canadian National Boys Work Secretary of the Y. M. C. A.; E. W. Halpenny, Secretary of the Ontario Sunday School Association; Rev. W. F. Ross, Secretary of the N. B. and P. E. I. Sunday School Association and A. S. McAllister, Y. M. C. A. field secretary for the Maritime Provinces. The Executive committee of the Provincial Sunday School Association has already had a meeting and decided to push forward the project. This committee is composed of: Rev. G. M. Young, Tryon; Rev. J. C. Martin, Cardigan; Rev. C. E. Armstrong, Summerside; and C. J. Reilly and J. A. Clark of this city. A local committee of arrangements which is composed of the superintendents of the city Sunday schools together with the local representatives of the above committee will hold a meeting on Monday evening, when the detail arrangements of carrying out the conference will be taken up.

CHARLOTTETOWN TOURISTS.—Charlottetown was well represented on the passenger list of the magnificent new Allan Line "Albatross" when she sailed from Halifax on her maiden East bound voyage on the 31st ult. SUCCESSFUL ISLANDER.—In the Civic Elections held in Amherst, N. S., on February 3rd last, Mr. J. Peter Gordon was elected as one of the Councillors for that town. Mr. Gordon has already served at the Council Board of Amherst and in that capacity acquired himself again as a Candidate in the recent election he was returned by an overwhelming majority over all other Candidates. Mr. Gordon is an Islander and has resided in Amherst for the past ten years. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. James Gordon, Appin Road.

HOCKEY SPECIAL.—The hockey special which conveyed the Abegweit hockey team and a large number of their supporters and friends to Summerside left Charlottetown about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The reason for the delay in leaving was on account of Rodd, who, it was thought, would referee the hockey match in Summerside, not putting in an appearance. When he did not arrive the boys had to hunt up another and they finally found Mr. James Herrell. The train returned to Charlottetown at an early hour this morning, about 3 o'clock. Close on a hundred excursionists made the trip.

THOROUGHbred FOXES.—The first general meeting of the Thoroughbred Silver Black Foxes Ltd., was held in the office of J. K. Ross, Masonic Building, Thursday evening at 8 o'clock.
