"Ever Since Eve" At The Capitol

A fast and breezy comedy romance titled "Ever Since Eve," Fox Film's latest release, made its appearance at the Capitol Theatre yesterday and kept the audience in high spirits throughout. George O'Brien, who has long been associated with Westerns, has the leading role, and his change from breeches and spurs to top hat and tails is entirely a happy one. As a man-about-town, O'Brien gives a splendid performance in this hilarious comedy.

A young man finds himself the foster son of three goldminers. It becomes necessary for him to go East, on an important errand. His three parents are confirmed worriers, and are hesitant about sending him, for fear he may become the victim of some winking woman. He finally does go East, and is accompanied by one of his parents, who is instructed to keep a watchful eye upon his activities. It is all to no avail, because the young man falls for a debutante, and shortly afterward marries her. But he soon learns that his wife has hooked him for his money. He does not, however, give her a chance to explain that she is also deeply in love with him. He returns home with his bride, and tries to impress his parents with his assumed happiness. The girl soon wins her way into the hearts of the three partners, and they learn of her unhappiness. How they and the young bride bring the young man to his senses, is so funny that you must really see the picture to appreciate its hilarity.

Mary Brian is ideally suited to her role as the bride of O'Brien, for her performance is a delightful piece of work. The other members of the cast who enact their roles perfectly, are Herbert Mundin, Bolly Blythe, Roger Imhof, Russell Simpson and George Meeker.

CONGRESSWOMAN FAVORS LEGALIZED GAMBLING

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—Legalized gambling in the United States capital was favored today by Representative Mary T. Norton, one of the few women in Congress.

In an interview she suggested that gambling should be "brought into the open" under proper safeguards and strict government regulation.

"If prohibition taught us anything, it certainly taught us that the only way to correct a situation was to face the facts," she declared.
