NEGOTIATION FOR WATERWAYS TREATY

OTTAWA, Jan 17—Sir Wilfrid Laurier said yesterday in the Commons that negotiations were still in progress in connection with the final ratification of the International Waterways Treaty and the result would likely be announced in a few days.

REDUCTION IN CABLE AND WIRELESS

OTTAWA, Jan 18.—Hon Mr Lemieux has given notice of an important Government measure. Its object is the substantial reduction of cable rates to and from Canada. The bill proposes to place the control for wireless and cable telegraphy under the Railway Commission on the same principle as in the case of the telephone and telegraph companies.

ONE OR MORE DREADNOUGHTS SAYS TORONTO

Conservative Association in Mr. Mr. Foster's Riding Favors Gift to Britain.
