Otario Tobacco Growers Now Plant Potatoes

WINDSOR, Ont., July 28—Compelled to abandon tobacco growing because of greatly decreased prices, many Essex county farmers have cropped their lands with potatoes, which are resulting better profits than ever derived from cultivating the weed.

One farmer, whose chief crop for years past has been tobacco, will make himself at least \$4,000 for eight acres of potatoes now being marketed by him at \$2 a bushel.

A few farmers, who have refused to go back on tobacco, report the best quality in many years.

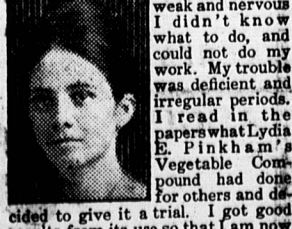

MASKED MEN ROB HAMILTON BANK

HAMILTON, Ont., July 29—Masked bandits shortly before closing time today entered the western branch of the Bank of Hamilton covered the staff with revolvers and escaped with \$3,000 in cash. The hold-up men drove up to the bank in a car that was stolen this morning and were traced after the robbery to another part of the city where they sped away and succeeded in making their escape.

Prisoners in Russia Demanded by U.S.

WASHINGTON, July 30—The United States has demanded the immediate release of American prisoners in Russia. It was announced at the State Department today. Without such release, Russia can expect no economic assistance from this country, she has been informed.

The demand is taken as Government endorsement of the recent communication of Herbert Hoover, as chairman of the United States Relief Administration to Russian authorities. The proposition for release of the Americans, of whom there are seven or eight, is thus made a diplomatic, as well as an economic issue.

The communication was sent to United States Consul Albrecht at Reval, for transmission to the Russian authorities. This fact does not in any way involve recognition of the Soviet Government, it was stated officially. A communication on the subject of trade was sent through the same channels on March 25, it was pointed out.

Uprising in China

PEKIN, July 29—Fear of a general uprising along the Yangtze-Kiang river is felt here as a result of hostilities between the provinces of Hunan and Tsuchi, the former under control of the Canton of Southern Chinese government, and the latter under jurisdiction of the Peking or duly constituted Chinese government.

Troops from Hunan have invaded Hupeh with the evident intention of ousting Wang Chan-Yuen, inspecting commissioner of the two provinces, whose authority, however, is not recognized by Hunan. Wang Chan-Yuen is one of the three "war lords" who met recently at Tien-Tsin to impose their will upon the Peking government causing a reorganization of the cabinet.

Despatches from Canton sent to the southern government, would seem to indicate that the invasion is prompted by Dr. Sun Yat-Sen, head of that government, and in line with his plan to accomplish coalition of the Yangtze-Kiang and Southwestern Provinces against Peking.

CANTON, July 29—The constitutional government here has issued instructions to the provinces of Hunan, Szechow, Kwan-Tung, Yunnan and Kwei-Chow to co-operate in efforts seeking to abolish the military domination of the Yangtze-Kiang river territory by forces operating under the Peking government.

Troops from Hunan and Szechow provinces are advancing on Hupeh, for the purpose of eliminating Wang Chan-Yuen. In addition to these troops, the Canton government also is despatching forces from three other directions with Dr. Sun Yat-Sen, head of the Canton government reported to be personally leading one division.

Lord Northcliffe Again Criticised

LONDON, July 30.—In the House of Commons yesterday Mr. Lloyd George made the following statement. "Statements appeared in certain organs of the Irish-English press attributing words of grave consequence to His Majesty the King relating to the Irish policy. They appear in the form of an interview which Lord Northcliffe seems to have given the United States and have caused to be forwarded to his newspapers here for publication. The interview, which the Prime Minister referred to quoted the King saying to Mr. Lloyd George just before His Majesty left for Ireland, 'You are going to shoot all the people in Ireland' which the minister is quoted as replying 'No Your Majesty.' 'Well, then you must come to some agreement with them', said the King, according to the interview 'this thing can't go on, I can't have my people killed in this manner.'"

Movies Make Epoch In Surgical Advance

BERLIN, July 30—A cinematographic achievement, which undoubtedly has proved epoch-making, has just been demonstrated in Berlin's great charity hospital in the presence of prominent physicians and journalists.

The films showed every stage of half a dozen operations, including an operation for fracture of the patella, one for the extirpation of the breast and an operation on the stomach and abdominal cavity as performed by men like Professor Bier, Professor Fraenkel et al.

The process is the invention of Doctor Alexander von Rothe, chief physician of the Wilmersdorf Hospital, who long has been working with the assistance of the Ministry of Education and the Cinematographic Technical Association to find a method of filming the operations, which should show every motion without disturbing the surgeon or employing illumination likely to counteract the asepasis.

The lens of the apparatus is contained in an atmospheric case which is suspended directly over the field of operation and the film ribbon, which often is six hundred meters long, passes through a tube from the reel in an adjoining room.

The pictures secured show an operation precisely as seen by the operating surgeon's eye. Even the threads of the closing stitches are observable.

Indeed, the films give even a more faithful and more complete picture of every movement than can be seen by those around the operating table.

The possibilities of the films for teaching and for making it possible for surgeons in the various countries to study each others' technique cannot be exaggerated, in the view of leading men here.

Quebec Counterfeiters Use Dollar Bills

QUEBEC, July 28—Counterfeit \$10. bills are being circulated in Quebec by a gang of swindlers who are raising one dollar notes to ten. The high degree of their workmanship was evidenced this morning when one of these bills escaped the vigilant eye of a local teller when it was tendered to him as a deposit. Small storekeepers are being victimized by the counterfeiters who make small purchases and offer the suprious note in payment.

Turkish Retreat Is Cut Off

SMYRNA, July 30.—The retreat of the Turkish Nationalists operating off Ismid Peninsula is reported to have been cut off by the Greek columns which appeared some miles north of Eski Shehr according to advices received here today.

HON. M. E. BERNIER DEAD

ST. HYACINTHE, Que., July 29—Hon. Michael Edras Bernier, formerly minister of interior, under the Laurier government and later a member of the railway commission, died here today aged 79 years.

In 1865 he married Alida, daughter of Simeon Merchessault one of the chiefs of the rebellion of 1837 who was afterwards exiled to Bermuda.
