P. W. C. DEBATE.—One of the most debated this year was held yesterday morning on the subject: "Resolved that women having the same qualifications as men should receive equal wages. The speakers were as follows: Pro—Lorne Wedlock, Katherine McLennan and Lloyd Haslam, Con—William Dabry, Mary Rogers, Cyril Heron, Evelyn Pihlan. The motion was carried that women does not receive her just dues in the home. If she is a well qualified as a man for a man's job she should receive his wages. When wages are not monetary, women are treated the same as men, so why is it not when in the business world? The idea that a man is man's inferior employed in the dark ages before Christianity. Fairness should control all our actions. A distinction of sex is as unfair as one of creed or nationality. The wages of sin, we are all sinners, and if God decreed that men and women should receive equal punishments, should not man agree to reward them equally? The common and great characteristics are common to both sexes, a salesmen and a woman should in many ways be equal wages without assuming equal responsibility. They are only serving their apprenticeship in business, and should not expect the same remuneration as the master. Whereas a salesman makes a life-long job of his position, a saleswoman does not put her whole soul into her work, but is patiently watching and waiting for something or somebody more interesting to turn up. Women can spend all their earnings, and then marry, but the men who have to support their families must have some money saved, and therefore should receive more wages. The pro side won the debate by the narrow margin of one vote, a margin which might have been increased had the members discerned that the carrying without regard to the clause concerning qualification in the resolution. The complimentary remarks of the critic Mr. Mellish, were heartily endorsed by the Honorary President.

IN MEMORIAM

CAPT. A. R. B. DUCK. The death occurred in this city Monday, after a lengthy illness, of Captain A. R. B. Duck, in the 46th year of his age.

Mr. Duck was a son of the late George Duck, of Pleasant Grove. He joined the Post Office service in March, 1912, being a member of Inspector Wheat's staff. In 1914 he enlisted for overseas in the First Contingent and spent three years in active service, returning to the Island in 1917, and resuming his postal duties.

Captain Duck before enlisting was for a number of years a member of the old 32nd Battalion, starting as a Private and being promoted to the rank of Captain and Adjutant in June, 1911. He always took an enthusiastic interest in military matters, and was an expert rifle shot.

His work in connection with the Postal Department was marked by faithfulness and efficiency. He was a man of fine physique, of excellent character, and enjoyed a wide popularity. He was a member of the Masonic and Odd Fellows Lodges. About a year ago he was laid aside from active duties owing to illness. His death is all the sadder from the fact that his wife (nee Miss Crockett) passed away in February last. They leave a son, Vernon, who is at present with Mrs. Duck's relatives at York.

Captain Duck is also survived by one brother, Wallace, on the homestead at Pleasant Grove, and three sisters, Mrs. Legual Crockett, York, Mrs. David Dover, Suffolk, and Mrs. Everett Dover, York.

To the bereaved relatives great sympathy is being extended in their hour of sorrow. The funeral will be held today, Wednesday, the 29th, instant. It will leave Wright's Undertaking Rooms at 1 p. m., and services will be held in the York Church at 2 o'clock. Reverend H. T. Smith, officiating.
