**FORMER ISLANDER'S DEATH**—News of the death of Mrs. James Hertz of Denver, Colorado, was received Wednesday by her relatives in this city. Mrs. Hertz passed away on the 9th inst., at the age of seventy-five years, after a long illness of dropsy and heart trouble. Her husband was well known here previous to his removal to Colorado. She was a daughter of the late Mrs. Charles Saunders, and a sister of Mr. John Saunders, of the well known firm of Saunders, Newsome and Co. Her relatives will have the sympathy of many friends.

**A SAD DEATH**—The death occurred at Little Sands last week, under very sad and tragic circumstances, of a young man, Mr. Robert McRae, aged 62, a highly respected farmer of that place. About 1 a. m. Mr. McRae left the house, after knocking at the door of his housekeeper's room and informing her that he intended to go to the shore to end his life in drowning. She at once got up and roused the neighbours, and a searching party proceeded to the shore but found no sign of the missing man. Later his body was accidentally discovered in a pond, not far from the house. It was lying in about two feet of water. An inquest was held and a verdict of suicide was rendered. Mr. McRae was a good circumstanced, and no cause was given for the sad occurrence. It was said that he was worrying a little about some property he owned in New Glasgow, N. S., but his condition was not such as to cause his friends uneasiness. The funeral was held on Saturday last, from the store for which he was a customer, and was unmarred. He has a number of relatives in Little Sands and vicinity and they have the sympathy of the community in their bereavement.

**Mr. DUNCAN CRAWFORD**
