Government Says Asquith Killing Labor's Chances

LONDON, January 17.—Sir William Joyce, Minister of Health, was put up by the Government to reply to Mr. Asquith's heavy artillery. He took up first the Clynnes' criticism of the Government attitude toward France, and bade him remember that the Conservatives were just as anxious as the Liberal party for peace and would willingly support the Labor party if it could, in its negotiations with France, make peace more certain.

He turned to co-operation with America, and said the Government had done their best to seek co-operation with that great country.

"She came to our aid, and to the aid of Europe in a very anxious time during the war, and I would that she come back after the war to assist in the difficult task of winning the peace," he said. "It is not for the British Government to seek to compel America to take any steps which the Government of that country does not deem right in her own interests. There has been nothing in the course of the present administration which has not tended to the utmost co-operation with America and the Government welcomed the negotiations which recently led to the appointment of the committee of experts, on which America is represented."

Sir William entered upon a detailed defense of what the Government had done to encourage housing, which led to his statistics being denied by David Kirkwood.

The Speaker intervened with a rebuke, asking Mr. Kirkwood not to speak all the time, but to listen to others, and Mr. Kirkwood raised a laugh by remarking, "I accept that thrust, Mr. Speaker."

Sir William warned Mr. Clynnes that for all his cooling as mildly as any sucking dove, he would have to reckon with his extremist supporters sitting behind him, and there came a heavy cheer from the Labor benches.

Then he came to the question of what party should control the House and said: "Why should it be assumed that a party of less than a third of the members of the House must necessarily take office? I am rather bored by hearing the statement that the Conservatives are a discredited party. Have we not returned from the country stronger than any of the other parties? Was not our policy supported by more electors than that of any other policy? Mr. Asquith has boasted that the Liberals are the only party whose policy has not been decisively rejected by the country. For my part, I would sooner be rejected with 250 followers than not be rejected with 150."

Sir William read quotations from a score of election addresses of the Liberal members including Mr. Lloyd George, Sir John Simon and Lady Ferrington, declaring how they would, if elected, fight the Socialists, and concluded with this declaration:

"We make no offer to the Liberal party. We ask no help from the Liberal party. But I say to them, that theirs is the responsibility for putting into office—not merely for turning us out—a party with whose policy they do not agree."

"You may turn us out if you like, but I do not think it will be for very long. It will be no harm to us. You can do no good to the Labor Party, but of this I am quite sure, you will prevent your party being in office for a hundred years to come." (Loud ministerial cheers.)

HODGES' MAJORITY SPEECH

In the debate which followed, intense interest was taken in the maiden speech of Frank Hodges, secretary of the Miners' Federation. It was he who, a year or two ago, by a speech made at midnight in a committee room of the House of Commons during the great coal strike, put the party in such a position of light that the members hurried over to Downing street, and called Mr. Lloyd George from bed to hear what Mr. Hodges had to put forward, and thereby a long step was taken toward settling the strike.

Today Mr. Hodges spent little time in the House, but the approaching "revolution" except to remark that it was a good thing it was "likely to result in spilling of more ink than blood, and went straight to his great desire to make politics real and living as affecting the industries of the nation.
