United Church Presbytery Notes The Prince Edward Island Presbytery of the United Church of Canada met a short time ago at Hurst Hall, Charlottetown, at 10:30 a.m. on Nov. 17th. The Rev. T. A. Wilson, who arrived late, was Secretary. The Executive of the W. M. M. and the members of the Presbytery worshipped together. Mrs. A. J. Matheson, President of the W. M. M., took part in the service. After the devotions the reading of the docket report and proceeded to its regular business. The minutes of the last meeting were read. Rev. L. M. Murray was appointed Assistant Secretary and Rev. J. A. Nicholson was appointed reporter.

The Presbytery passed a resolution expressing its sympathy with Rev. John Sirling in his illness. Rev. Sirling has been a faithful member of the Presbytery for many years and he was missed at the meeting. A letter was received from Rev. George Tilley of Cavendish for a change of Pastoral Relations. This was referred to the Pastoral Relations Committee which responded with a letter of appreciation. Letters from Rev. G. A. Christie and G. Sisco were received concerning the good work of the students on their respective mission fields. These reports were referred to the Committee on Education and Students. All students under the direction of the Presbytery were certified to their colleges. One young man was received as a student for the Ministry. Rev. Hugh Miller spoke of the need of literature for inmates of Dorchester Penitentiary. This matter was brought to the Presbytery in a letter from Rev. Canon Spurr. This was referred to the committee on Evangelism and Social Service. A letter was received from Rev. K. Sullivan, now in the Chaplaincy Service.

Reports were given by the commissioners to the General Council. Revs. W. I. Green, Dr. Hugh Miller and Messrs. H. MacFarlane and W. E. Brooks. The delegates reported different aspects of the Council's work. Rev. W. I. Green reported the missionary situation in the Church and stressed the need of spiritual dedication. Rev. Dr. Miller concurred with Rev. Green in his remarks. He spoke of the tenure of Moderatorship and the war work of the societies of the United Church. Mr. J. H. MacFarlane spoke of the Memorial Service, the temperance delegation to the Prime Minister and other matters. He referred to the Theological Colleges and paid high tribute to the new Moderator, Dr.

The groom has been prominent in musical circles in Boston, where he sang in the oldest historic church in that city, while the groom is one of our best known and most widely known citizens of this Province, he was Mayor of the City from 1918 to 1920 and subsequently served several terms as Water Commissioner. He was re-elected Water Commissioner by acclamation last January and he has continued to take an active interest in everything affecting the community. Presentations of Medals Yesterday The Confederation Chamber was the scene of a ceremony of more than passing interest yesterday afternoon at 2 p.m., when Captain Murdoch James MacLean was presented with an Imperial Service Medal for long and faithful service as Constable Strong, R.C.M.P., received the Royal Canadian Humane Association medal for the rescue of Arnold McCallum, from the Hillsboro River on 8th of April, 1942.

In making the presentation to Captain MacLean, His Honor, Lieutenant-Governor B. W. LePage said: "There has been forwarded to me from the Hon. J. E. Michaud, Minister of Transport an Imperial Service Medal, which His Majesty the King has been graciously pleased to award to Captain Murdoch James MacLean, of Charlottetown, for his long and faithful service in His Majesty's Government. This Medal is only awarded to those who merit by their faithful and efficient attendance to duty."

"I have brought honour, not only to yourself, but to the entire Province as well, and the citizens of this Province are proud of you."

Scelator, Mr. W. E. Brooks spoke of the part the Laymen had in the Church work. He told of the book "How Therefore Oughtest" which will soon be placed in the hands of all ministers. He stressed the importance of the Murray Fund. This report was received by the Presbytery with appreciation. The Presbytery met in the afternoon at 2:30. A short devotional service was held. Mr. W. E. Brooks reported the success of the Laymen's Annual Conference which was held in York, P. E. I. A. S. Weir presented the M. & M. report. The allocations for all the Churches in the Presbytery were read and on motion accepted. The M. & M. report was adopted after considerable discussion.

Dr. Endicott of Toronto was then heard with pleasure by the Presbytery. He reported that in the War Savings' Certificate Campaign for the Church Debt - \$1,877,000, was received. He pointed out that the President Roosevelt is now a strong believer in Foreign Missions as a result of his study of the world situation since he became President. Dr. Endicott said that the people in the Church should sacrifice more and should help the M. & M. fund to a greater extent. He was thanked for his address. He was accompanied on his visit by Rev. W. S. Godfrey who also received a warm welcome. The report of the Pension Fund was given by Rev. D. J. Morrison. The Publications report was given by Rev. L. M. Murray. A panel discussion was held under the direction of Mr. Murray with several members taking part. Several important matters were then presented to the Pastoral Relations Committee. Rev. S. J. Boyce giving the report. Several other committees reported and after much discussion the Presbytery adjourned.
