HARVEST TRAIN CRIMES.

There has been an alarming increase of crime within the past few years in our fair Dominion, which until recently was one of the most sober, moral and orderly countries on earth. This increase is shown by official statistics of convictions, which recorded the number brought into court and put on trial for their offences. There is reason to believe that there has been a still greater increase in the lawlessness that is not finished.

The increase in crime has been pretty generally laid at the door of the foreign immigration but there is a painful evidence that it is not all due to that cause. The recent atrocious and heinous outrages committed by a trainload of harvesters in transit to the Northwest—that trainload of backguards," as the Montre Star calls it—were not the work of foreigners, for the harvesters were mainly made up of native Canadians none the less the disgrace of it.

As the Star says, if half the revolting stories are true we may wonder if we have any law in this country. But making all allowances and assuming that the backguards and criminals on the train were but a small portion of the whole, is it not still a reflection upon the more decent members of the community, that the lawless miscreants among them were not prevented from their revolting misconduct, or overpowered and held for justice by the majority, or at least handed over to the officers of justice? The incident is a disgrace to Canada.

We quote further from the Star: "If even a fair proportion of the incidents which are told occurred, the authorities ought to make an example of the scoundrels who perpetrated them which will be remembered for a generation. Crimes are committed against them which should lead to the scaffold; and, if they be proven guilty men should go to the scaffold. That they crazed themselves with drink ought not to be considered for a moment as a mitigation but rather as an aggravation of their offence. A few hangings and a few stiff penitentiary sentences might discourage this sort of savagery to the future.

But the amazing part is that nothing was done sooner to put a stop to their raid upon the defenceless country and, more defenceless women upon the train. They seem to have swept along the railway line like a devastating horde; and yet they were carried merrily on, as if they were riding in their own carriage and subject to no law but that of the shot-gun. Apparently they were

from bad to worse, and began to think that they had escaped in this summer-time excursion from the limits of the law and order altogether. They were back in the Middle Ages and every beast was a law unto himself until he met a stronger."

The country waits with keen anxiety to know what the police authorities of the West will do. So far a mere handful have been arrested. Doubtless there were many on the train who were innocent of wrongdoing, and these should have been held as witnesses. It looks as if an effort is being made to gloss over and conceal the facts of this shameful incident. Hitherto we have been accustomed to think that justice, if slow-footed sometimes was fairly sure to track down and punish serious crimes. We shall see by the outcome of this atrocious affair whether or not the administration of justice has declined in efficiency at a time when crime is rampant.

Talk is cheap; talk about talk is the cheapest of all talk. Complaints are many in this uneven world, but when they are based on real, substantial grievances they ought to be listened to and the wrong complained of should be redressed. Complaints about complaints are in such cases as cheap and contemptible as talk about talk.

Hon. Mr. Foster, who addressed a large meeting last evening in Summerside, will speak tonight in Montserrat and on Wednesday night here. We sincerely hope and believe that many electors of both parties will go and hear him, and that when hereafter some Liberal leader or lieutenant of equal rank in the public life of Canada shall visit and address us that the electors of both parties will go and hear him also. Let both sides be heard. Fair minded men will desire to hear both sides, as only by so doing can they become fully informed as to the questions at issue.

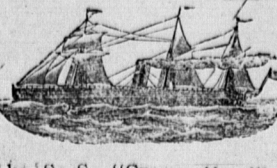
