Teachers Hold Convention at Uigg

A local convention of teachers was held in the Orange Hall at Uigg on August twenty ninth. Over fifty teachers were present and the local president, Mr. Eugene Dunn of Upper Montague, very capably presided.

The following committees were appointed. Nominations: Eugene Dunn, Thos. Harris, Miss Josie Jackson. Press: Lincoln Dewar, Bruce MacLaren. Resolutions: Misses Catherine MacLean, Selma Currie, Rebecca Cook.

The local president in his address reviewed the work done during the past year and spoke of some of the problems at present confronting the teaching body.

Inspector Wm. A. MacPhee spoke in his capable manner of several subjects of special interest such as: textbooks, school-fairs, study-groups, silent-reading, time-tables, etc.

An active discussion followed this address. A demonstration on the teaching of the general knowledge type of lesson was given by Prof. L. W. Shaw, Teacher of Methods in Prince of Wales College. It was followed with the close attention always given to Mr. Shaw's demonstrations. He stressed the necessity of building up ideas in the pupils' minds by making connections, through as many avenues as possible, with the experiences the pupils have already had.

The afternoon session began with a question-box, the answer to which furnished much valuable information.

Dr. Welmer, formerly on the staff of Harvard University, gave an interesting address on diet and its relation to health.

Miss Mona G. Wilson, Chief Red Cross Nurse for the province, spoke of the splendid work being done by the Red Cross and invited the continued co-operation of the teachers.

Mr. H. H. Shaw, Chief Supt. of Education, was the next speaker. He explained many problems which might give trouble to the inexperienced teacher. He stated that if a fall vacation is held, only one report is to be forwarded for the months of October and November. He also announced that during the present half-year, two half-holidays are to be granted the teachers for study-group work.

Mr. Shaw would like to see the making of portfolios and the beautification of school grounds become more general.

Inspector Hynes of Montague spoke briefly regarding the changes to be made by the appointment of additional inspectors.

The following resolutions were passed: 1. Resolved that this convention support any action taken by the Executive of the P. E. I. Teachers' Federation in its efforts to have teachers' salaries increased.

2. Resolved that the sympathy of this convention be extended to Miss Belle Bruce, a member of our executive, in her illness.

3. Resolved that the thanks of this convention be tendered to the Uigg Orange Lodge for the generous use of their hall, to the Women's Institute for the excellent dinner served, to the press for the publication of the report of this convention and to each of the speakers for the excellent addresses given.

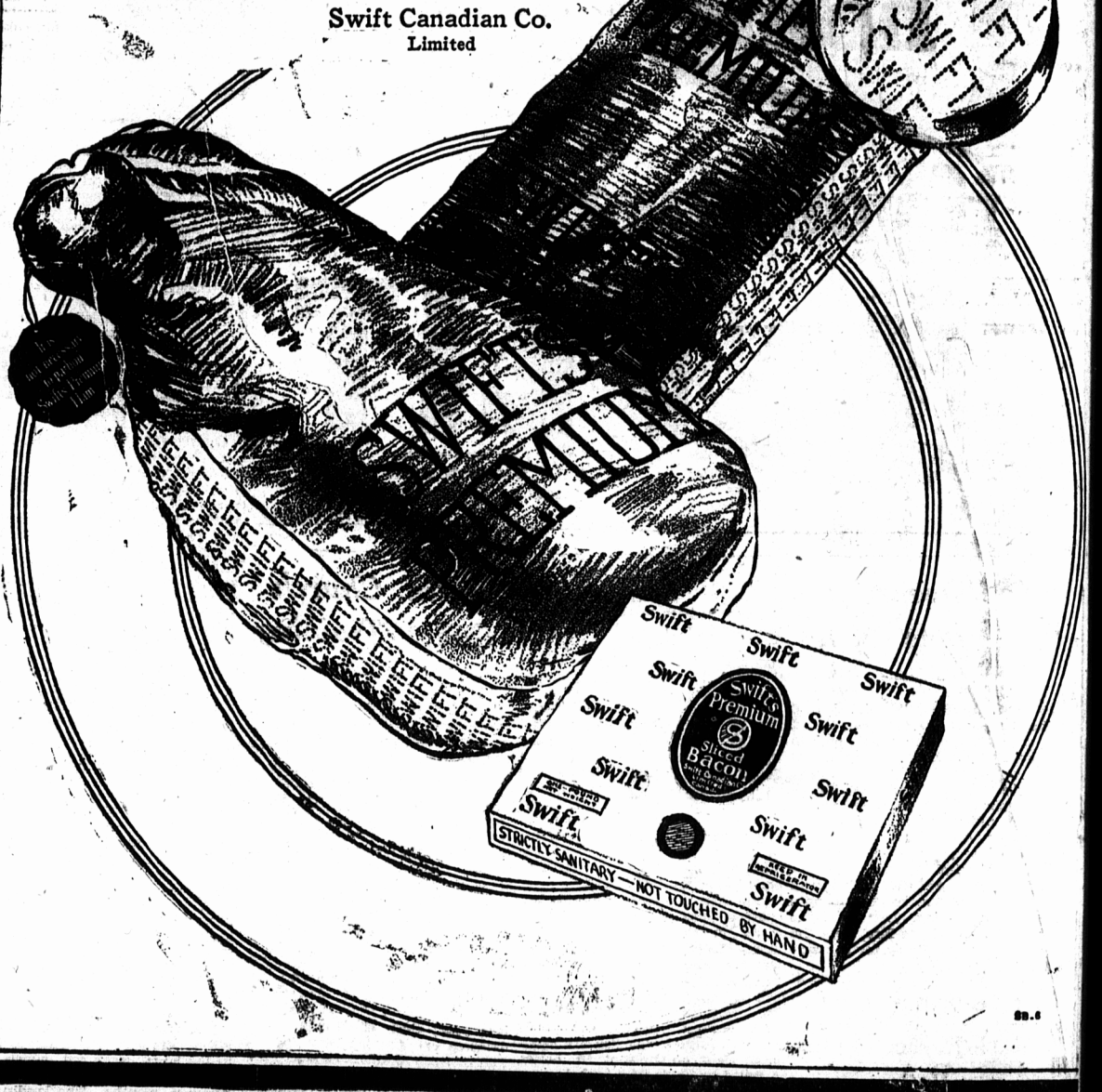
