Mortgage - holders Refuse Payments

EDMONTON, Oct. 28—(CP)—Complaints have reached the Provincial Government that mortgage-holders flatly refuse to accept payments from old debtors under Alberta's debt reduction and settlement act, Premier Aberhart disclosed here today.

The act, approved a month ago, provides for reduction of private debts contracted prior to July 1, 1932 by the amount of payments made since that time whether payments were made on principal or interest, the balance to be paid in 10 annual instalments without interest.

Asked if he had any knowledge of the complaints, the Premier said "Yes, I have. I have received a number of letters of this type and am very sorry this is the case."

Identifies Condemned Man As Son

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) REGINA, Oct. 28—(C.P.)—Walter L. Anderson, aged Regina resident, today identified as his son Frank W. Anderson, 16, who is to be hanged next Jan. 8 for the murder of a jail guard during an abortive attempt to escape. The father said the boy's name "is really Taylor Creswell Leslie Anderson." He promised a birth certificate as proof.

The grey-haired father said he visited the condemned cell at Regina jail and recognized the prisoner. He produced the birth certificate showing his son had been born at Carleton Place, Ont.

At the trial at 10:30 a.m. Sask., at which young Anderson was convicted of the murder of John Sangster, jail guard, a birth certificate was produced purporting to show the youth had been born at Brandon, Man.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 28—(AP)—St. Louis may have major league baseball under floodlights in 1937.

The board of directors of St. Louis Cardinals at a special meeting today authorized President Sam Breadon to take whatever steps he deemed advisable in the matter of lights in Sportsman's Park. Breadon is enthusiastic about night baseball but has been unable to convince a realty holding company which operates the park that it was practical.

"It all depends on the contract I can get," said Breadon.

Air Ministry Answers Criticism

LONDON, Oct. 28—(CP Cable)—The Air Ministry tonight replied to criticism by Lord Nuffield, motor car manufacturer, of its "shadow" scheme for manufacture of airplane engines with "an assertion that one of Lord Nuffield's plants specialized in engines of lower horse power than those required by the air force."

Lord Nuffield issued a statement last week, complaining of "political interests" in the Air Ministry, in explanation of his withdrawal of Wolseley Motors, Ltd., from the Government scheme. The scheme involved building six Government-owned factories for production of airplane engines.

The Air Ministry statement, issued in the form of a white paper, also said they were convinced that the best system was that whereby different firms would manufacture parts of airplane engines, instead of each one manufacturing entire engines.

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Not Recognized As Champion

NEW YORK, Oct. 28—(AP)—The New York State Athletic Commission today declined to recognize Henry Armstrong, Los Angeles negro, as new featherweight boxing champion.

The Commission pointed out that Armstrong's bout with Mike Bellosse in Los Angeles last night was not over the championship distance of 15 rounds and that, therefore, Bellosse still was recognized as champion. Armstrong won a close decision over the New Yorker in 10 rounds.

Petey Sarron of Birmingham, Ala., is recognized as 120-pound title-holder by the National Boxing Association.

English Team Triumphs In Field Hockey

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 27—(A.P.)—The United States women's field hockey team took possession of second place in the triennial International tournament today by beating South Africa, 6-2.

England continued undefeated with an easy 10-0 triumph over the Eterceras. Jane Dickenson scored seven times and Christina Goodman twice.

In the other games, Ireland, despite the loss of Captain Vera Mahony, beat Wales 4-2 while Australia, thanks to the four-goal shooting of Eva MacRae, came from behind a 4-2 score at half-time to defeat Scotland 5-4.

Seek Court Ruling On Millar Will

TORONTO, Oct. 28—(CP)—On the heels of the announcement executors of the estate of Charles Vance Millar will apply to the court Nov. 5 to determine the validity of the "stork derby" clause of his famous will, a writ on behalf of relatives was filed today in a last-minute effort to upset the \$500,000 bequest.

Action was taken by Samuel Factor, K.C., M.P., on behalf of Alexander Butcher and Arabella West, nephew and niece respectively, of the late Nancy Vance Millar and assignees of James Noel of Pasadena, Calif., on the grounds the derby clause is "contrary to public policy and is uncertain."

The executors said they would apply to Mr. Justice Middleton six days after the 10-year baby race ends for direction as to distribution of the estate.

Vagabond Cruise Ship Colborne Sails Today

MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 28—The "vagabond cruise" ship "Colborne" Canadian National Steamships, will be another ship to say adieu to the local port for the season when she sails Thursday night at six o'clock via Halifax for Puerto Rico, St. Kitts, Guadeloupe, Martinique, Barbados, St. Vincent, Trinidad and British Guiana, some of these ports being extra calls. The "Colborne" will use the port of Halifax for departure during the winter season and return to either Saint John or Halifax on the north bound voyages.

As the winter season approaches, vessels of the Canadian National Steamships are dropping out of the St. Lawrence route one by one, transferring to the Atlantic ports until next spring. Another "vagabond" ship, the "Chomedy" is still to reach here, being due on November 8 and sails again November 12, which will be her last appearance here for the season.

Plan Campaign To "Clean Up Wrestling"

NEW YORK, Oct. 28—(AP)—The first step in a new campaign to "clean up wrestling" was taken by the New York State Athletic Commission today.

Calling in every matchmaker in the city, the Commission laid down the law respecting loose methods, then showed it means business by clapping a \$1,000 fine on one club for rule infractions. This club, the Coliseum, admitted it advertised a card featuring Strangler Lewis recently, then substituted a wrestler for Lewis without notifying the public.

"Wrestling is being conducted too loosely," said Chairman John Phelan. "We are told wrestlers are made to sign blank contracts. Often they do not know who they are going to wrestle or how much they are to get until they reach the arena."

It developed that most of the local wrestlers are booked through rival groups controlled by the Dusek and Garibaldi brothers.

Nova Scotia Apples For South Africa

MONTREAL, Oct. 28—(CP)—First shipment of Nova Scotia apples to South Africa in 20 years will leave here tomorrow aboard the British freighter Calumet.

The Maritime Province fruit was exported at one time in considerable quantities to the African Dominion but in the past two decades has not figured in its trade.

South Africa has been a steady customer for British Columbia fruit-growers and reason for the preference over Nova Scotia apples was believed to be difference in packing methods.

British Columbia growers have always packed their apples, individually wrapped in paper, in boxes.

Mrs. Horace Andrew, President of the W.A. of St. John's Church presided. The church choir assisted by other local talent sang several selections of old army songs at intervals during Mrs. Crosby's talk.

Mrs. Crosby started her story with the great send off the Pilgrims received at Montreal on leaving for Vimy. She spoke particularly of the part Canon Scott took in dedicating the monument and described that impressive monument when a handful of earth from Ottawa was scattered over the feet of the figure. She described the beautifully kept graves of Canadian heroes as one lovely garden.

Various incidents in her trip, through Paris and Flanders were of much interest to many in her audience who had lost relatives in the Great War.

A brighter feature of the Pilgrimage was the reception at Buckingham Palace, when the Canadian visitors were the guests of the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester. Mrs. Crosby gave some beautiful illustrations of English scenery.
