A novel mode of street lighting may be seen on MacDonald Avenue in Montague, a method not generally seen in street lighting. When the new street was opened,

Mr. R.K. Clements, Montague district representative of the Maritime Electric, decided to introduce a new mode of locating the poles by placing them to the rear of the houses, rather than along the side of the road so as to avoid the appearance of poles on the street. To provide street lighting, Mr. Clements has run two steel copper-covered wires from pole to pole, and has hung the light directly over the centre of the road. The wires will carry the current to the light which seems to provide more efficient light to both sides than the other method of placing the light on a pole at one side of the road. Through Mr. Clements' efforts, MacDonald Avenue is one of the finest streets in the Province with its 80-foot wide road and sidewalks on both sides. Certainly after the planting of trees and hedges, it will turn out to be one of the finest residential sections.
