**THE SOUTHERN CRIMES.**

Of all the crimes that have been the outcome of race hatred in the United States, the murder of the Rev. L. A. Planving, a few days ago, at a place called Oscar, in Louisiana, was the most stupid and indefensible says the Montreal Witness. Mr. Planving was a negro and a personal friend of the famous Booker Washington. He was the founder and principal of the Pointe Coupee Industrial College which he had established on the model of the Tuskegee Institute for educating the negroes, elevating them morally and fitting them generally for the proper performance of the duties of citizenship. He is described as a man of deep religious convictions, highly intelligent, unusually well educated and devotedly earnest in his efforts for the moral and material improvement of his people. Apologists for the infamous crime of his taking off assert that his speeches were incendiary, that in addition to teaching Booker Washington's doctrine of work he went further and taught that negroes should work for themselves only, and not for the whites; that they should own the land and cultivate it for themselves. The result of his teaching, it is claimed, was that it was impossible of late for the whites to get labor of any kind in the neighborhood for the plantations of domestic service. No proofs are offered to substantiate the charge, but it is quite possible that Mr. Planving, in teaching the virtues of self-reliance and urging his people to aspire to some position better than that of being laborers and servants for the whites, may have helped in producing the conditions of which complaint was made. For this he was foully and treacherously murdered, and those who were his assistants were warned to desist or leave the parish. A crime like this, while it encourages ignorant, fanatical white men in the commission of similar outrages, cannot fail to deepen the animosity of the blacks against the whites, who evidently want to keep them in ignorance and servitude by denying them even the right to better their condition. Of all wars, a racial, servile war is the most pitiless and abominable in the ferocity and cruelty of its reprisals. To murder their heroes is the surest way to embitter the blacks and unite them for a great race struggle.

The British Monthly for September has for its chief feature an interesting and well illustrated sketch of Rev. Dr. MacGregor of St. Cuthbert's, Edinburgh. Dr. MacGregor was a member of the Marquis of Lorne's expedition which crossed Canada to the Pacific in 1881. Referring to that event, the writer of the sketch says: "At that time the Canadian Pacific Railway had only got some sixty or seventy miles west of Winnipeg, and the expedition really started from the end of the line. While there Dr. MacGregor asked to be allowed to lay a sleeper, which he did." Other members of Lord Lorne's suite followed his example, and Van Horne, one of the directors of the railway, thereupon stated that he would call stations between Portage la Prairie and Brandon by the names of members of the suite. This was done, stations being named MacGregor, De Winton, Austin, Percival, Bagot, etc. 'MacGregor' is now a flourishing town, and is rapidly growing. It has a newspaper and a church, the latter being very appropriately, named St. Cuthbert's. A request was made for a portrait of Dr. MacGregor to hang in the church, and a photograph of the senior minister of St. Cuthbert's Edinburgh, adorns that little church of St. Cuthbert's in the far west of Manitoba. A half-page photograph of the town and church at MacGregor is given, as well as many portraits of the "Wee MacGregor" himself.

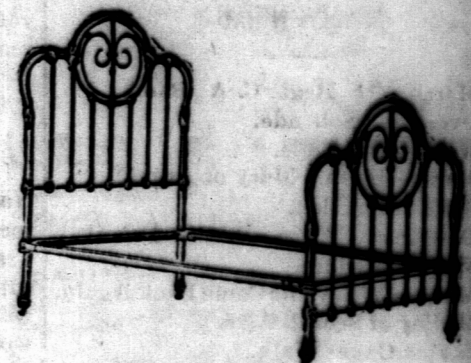
