Inspiring Address By National President To P.E.I. Women's Institute

Following is the text of the address delivered last night at the Women's Institute convention by Mrs. C. O. MacMillan, Fairview, president of the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada.

"It is a privilege to come once more to our Provincial Convention and to speak a few words about the F.W.I.C.—an organization which has done so much for rural Canada. This is the first time I have had the opportunity to speak to any W.I. group since being elected National President, and an honor is not mine, but belongs to the Province, and I just happen to be the incumbent in office.

"I realize the magnitude of the task especially following such a capable executive as Mrs. Cameron Dow and I ask for your support and co-operation.

"I am also delighted to congratulate the recipients of the F.W.I. Life Membership and I would like to voice the sentiments of the citations and I hope they will live long and have good health to continue in their earnest endeavors for Home and Country. It is very fitting that on this 50th anniversary we should do honor to members who have performed such outstanding service and I hope in the not too distant future other members who have merited such rewards shall be similarly honored.

"Much has been accomplished in the past fifty years but there is a great task ahead and we shall follow with confidence for health and strength to carry on. We take pride in the expansion of our organization, first to the Motherland, then to the Scandinavian countries, Holland, Belgium, Latvia, India, and other countries where it is known as "Canada's gift to the Country Women of the World."

F.W.I.C. Objectives

"The F.W.I.C. is the outgrowth of the Provincial W.I. It is a clearing house for the activities of the Provincial Institute but it has also the following objectives:

1. To raise the standards of homemaking.
2. To develop agriculture.
3. To promote educational, moral, social and economic measures.
4. To encourage co-operation and community efforts.
5. To initiate nation wide campaigns in accordance with the objectives of the Federation.

"Every Province has representatives on the Federal Board and officers are elected at the Biennial Board Meeting for a period of two years.

"Every member in good standing in the Provincial W. I. is entitled to the privileges as well as assuming the responsibilities of that organization.

"Finally, I always to the fore in the F.W.I.C. and until 1945 contributions were on a voluntary basis but that was neither businesslike nor satisfactory. Now we have a rate of 2c per individual member and, while we could do so much more did finances permit, still it is a great step forward over the old system.

"We are still working toward a Central Office in Ottawa with a secretary. However, this year we did combine the offices of Recording, Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer with a paid Secretary.

"I would like to see more of our Provincial W. I. members wear the F.W.I.C. pin. You are all entitled to wear it and the only difference between the pin you are entitled to wear and the officers of the F.W.I.C. is that we have a bar.

"The F.W.I.C. have two conveners—Home Economics and Citizenship and also Counsellors who are the superintendents of Women's Institutes in the various Provinces. They carry no vote but are very helpful in making decisions and by their experience in the different fields of endeavor they are able. We always welcome them at our Board meetings and are very grateful to the Department of Agriculture for making it possible for Miss Macdonald and Miss Hazard to be with us at Halifax.

Youth Council Affiliation

"This year, the F.W.I.C., realizing the need for more support and encouragement to the youth of Canada, have become affiliated with the Canadian Boys and Girls Youth Council. The F.W.I.C. on this Board and it is hoped in this way to create more interest not only Provincially but in the Dominion competition as well.

Immigration Policy

"A resolution was sent to the Federal Government asking that Canada admit immigrants of proper selection. Two years ago such a resolution was presented to the attention of this Provincial organization but it was voted down. I believe if you take a long range view of the situation you will find Canada needs more immigrants. You will all agree with me that we need farm help and help in the house. When this resolution was brought before the Convention it was running very high and in many cases the high there was the case of our own young people not having suitable employment but you must remember we are bending every effort and in many cases taking every available dollar to educate our young people.

"The Federal Government is assisting in every way the veteran to get an education and that is what we want but what happens here is that thousands of dollars spent on the best brains in our country? When they are ready for a position there are no positions and consequently they are exported and does lose them. They must find employment elsewhere. You all know that for every clergyman, doctor, lawyer or scientist, we must have farm laborers, miners, industrial workers and so on. We have only 1,000,000 people but we have unlimited resources that have not yet been scratched. We have water power that could be harnessed to produce power for countless industries but we have not the resources behind these resources to develop them and no government or private enterprise will attempt to develop them unless they have the labor and also the money. Our educated young people are not going to be hewers of wood and carriers of water. What then is the solution?

"F. W. I. C. has the highest per capita population in Canada and we are not overcrowded but look at the other Provinces especially the Western Provinces, Alberta for instance, with a density such as ours would have 11,000,000 people.

Natural Resources

"If we had immigration sufficient to develop our natural resources then our young people would find employment in the field for which they are qualified. The professional man would be needed and the immigrant coming in would be unskilled and he could do the work. We would then have a market for our farm produce, our coal, our wood products.

"The United States became a first rate power for this very reason. She brought in unskilled labor and developed her resources. I believe the same for Canada.

"We must change our attitude toward immigration if we are to keep our own young people home and if we are to make Canada the land of opportunity.

"There is another way we can increase the population of Canada and that is by endeavoring to decrease the infant mortality rate. There is something wrong with our health system. When 25,000 babies under 12 months die every year and what is a more alarming fact is the death rate of more than twice as high in the rural areas as in the urban centres. There might be a reason for this in widely scattered population, areas far from doctors and hospitals but that is not the problem here.

Displaced Persons

"Then there is the case of displaced persons: 1,000,000 still in camps in Europe; many have been

there since 1945, and all since the cessation of hostilities. The longer they are in these camps, the more difficult it will be to absorb them into our economic and social life. It is our duty as a Christian nation to take a portion of these persons and if we fail we are not living up to our duty as Canadians.

"It was also recommended that education for citizenship for youth until 17 to 21 should be given up until 17 years and every one aware more or less trained for citizenship through the schools and colleges but there seems to be a gap there and at 21 he or she rolls his or her vote as a citizen of Canada. How many realize the privileges and advantages that is theirs. Why they vote. What freedom they have compared to other countries and other forms of government. We should also have adult education in citizenship for all.

"Our country proved their loyalty when the call came in 1939 but was each and every one aware of the reasons that led up to this war? We should know more about our country and our laws and these are matters that not only our F.W.I.C. should be interested in but locals and provincials as well.

Rural Development

"The F. W. I. C. are also taking as a national project—home improvement and rural development, with accent on youth. Miss Rose, from The Country Guide, Winnipeg, spoke on housing. We need more houses but we also need better houses. During the war, 100,000 women went from farms in Canada into war jobs. The question is: Will they be content to go back remembering the inconveniences of farm houses or will they swell the future unemployment of urban centres? With the use of labor saving devices in the farm home, remodelled kitchens, furnaces, hot and cold water and, of course, improved roads and community centres, our young

people would be content to stay on the farm.

"We must bring the city conveniences to the rural areas. We know finance play an important part here but in many cases we get more or less in a rut and let well enough alone. That is something our W. I. must make ourselves to. We must make country life attractive and the F.W.I.C. with its primary aims of improving farm home conditions have a real job right here.

"There are many other things I would like to touch on but I would just say this: Study and learn about the work of our organization throughout Canada. Read the Federated News which is sent to every Secretary and published quarterly. Report your meetings and projects to your Provincial Convener who will report same to the National Convener. Appreciate the splendid work that has been accomplished in the past and let us each and every one, by precept and example, free from hatred and intolerance, while thinking and acting according to the principles of justice and truth, try to make this a better place in which to live so that the words Institute and Home and Country will have a very special meaning, not only in our own district but in our Province, in Canada and in the world, and, too, let us remember, as Canadians, we are proud of our heritage and freedom and we will strive at all times to be good citizens in the true sense of the word."
