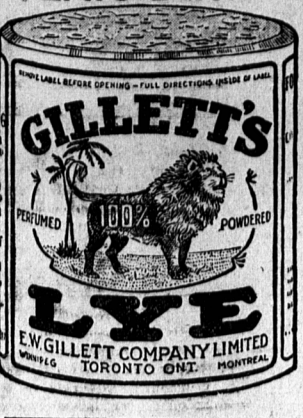

It says that at a London chemical laboratory a process has been discovered of manufacturing synthetically a pure and wholesome milk of highest nutritive value from a casein obtained from the soya bean and from this milk has been made excellent butter and cheese.

KILL OFF THE MALE BIRDS NOW

Eggs which have been fertilized constitute the greatest proportion of the inferior stock which, when examined, proves unfit for food. It is not necessary that these shall have remained for a time under a broody hen, a temperature of seventy degrees being, in itself, sufficient to cause the germ to commence to grow. If the heat is constant the development of the chick will continue, but if it ceases or is intermittent, putrefaction at once sets in, and the egg becomes bad.

On the other hand, infertile eggs which are free from the active germ cell, do not, under ordinary conditions, deteriorate seriously.

The trotting stallion Billy Burke, sold by a New York owner, left for Russia, carrying two policies of insurances for \$40,000 each, one covering the sea voyage and the other the life of the horse for one year, sea risks included. The purchaser was the Russian ambassador to the United States, Mr. Geo. Bakhmeteff, who is also a member of the Imperial St. Petersburg Society for the Encouragement of Breeding Trotting Horses. He paid J. Howard Ford \$40,000, after the horse had passed Dr. McCully's examination for soundness. Billy Burke is a good-looking, as well as a sound, horse, but many such are to be found in all parts of the country, and Mr. Bakhmeteff might have secured a shipload for the amount he paid for this one, were he seeking simply appearance and freedom from constitutional defects.

THE VALUE THAT RACING GIVES (continued) ... Many Uses of Eggs. A concentrated albuminous water made from six eggs and a quart of water is a remedy in some cases of poisoning. The white of egg is used externally as a soothing medium for burns, either alone or whipped with oil. When whipped with alcohol it is used as a dressing for bed sores. In cases of fracture, the white of egg is used for soaking the bandages, thus binding them together and promoting knitting of the fracture. The white also is used largely in clarifying liquids and in the preparation of household cements. The yolk of egg is used in some cases of cancer and dysentery, in poultices and various salves. Oil is extracted from the yolk and is used a good deal in cold countries for chapped hands, for burns and to prevent poxmarks. There are many uses to which eggs are put besides being eaten. In many factories they are used largely, as well as in medicine for external and internal purposes. Medically, they seldom are used in cases of fever, on account of their nutritive value, but they often are prescribed

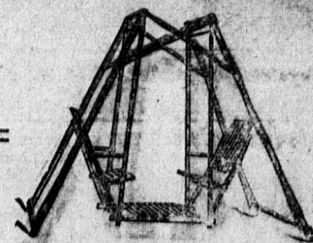
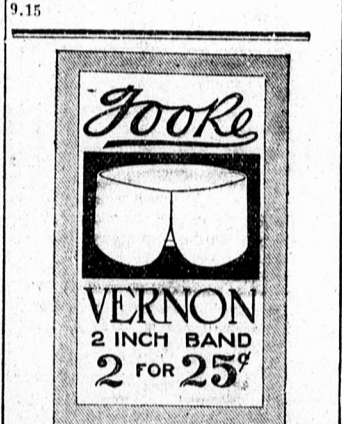
