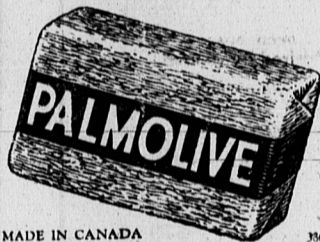

In Memoriam

MR. ALVIN F. WEBSTER

The death occurred Monday afternoon in Franklin, Mass., of Alvin F. Webster, a former resident of this city.

The late Mr. Webster for many years successfully conducted a steam laundry in this city, removing in November, 1921, with Mrs. Webster to Halifax, where he opened an up-to-date grocery store.

Eight months ago he was stricken with pernicious anemia and about two months ago he left for Franklin, Mass., for medical treatment, but despite the best medical attention and tender nursing passed away Monday afternoon.

He leaves to mourn, a sorrowing widow, (nee Jessie Currie) to whom the Guardian, with many friends, extends sincere sympathy.

Mr. J. A. Webster, Commissioner of Sewers and Water Supply, is a brother.

The late Mr. Webster was of a most kindly and jovial disposition and many friends in this city and province will regret to learn of his passing.

The remains will arrive in this city on Thursday night; funeral announcement later.

WALTER E. ROBERTSON.

The people of Kingsboro and other parts of Prince Edward Island were painfully reminded a few days ago of the truth of Montgomery's words.

"There is no union here of hearts that finds not here an end" when word was received from Brighton, Mass., that Walter Robertson had departed this life following an operation at Newton hospital.

A little over a month ago, accompanied by Mrs. Robertson and baby Christine he left home to visit relatives in Boston and neighbouring towns. Soon after his arrival he was stricken with illness, which necessitated his removal to the hospital where he underwent an operation on March 23rd, and died on March 28th. Mrs. Robertson brought the body home for burial in the family plot at Kingsboro. Before leaving, Rev. E. A. MacPhee of Boston, a native of Long Creek, P. E. I. and a former pastor of Mr. Robertson's home church conducted a service at which many Island friends were present.

Walter Robertson was the only son of the late S. S. Robertson of Kingsboro, so well and favorably known on the Island and of Christina MacLean Robertson whose memory is a benediction to all who knew her. He was born on February 4th, 1896 and was therefore but thirty-two years of age, his life was brief, but since "we live in deeds not years"

He lived much in the few years allotted to him on earth. Born in a home of refinement and of high ideals, nurtured in all the virtues of true manhood we would expect to find in him an admirable type of man, and we were not disappointed.

He was a lover of truth. To him, "beauty was truth, truth beauty" His word could ever be trusted.

Fidelity was one of his outstanding characteristics in things great or small with exactitude and scrupulous honor he kept faith. This sense of obligation to his trust was vital and it helped to make him prudent in promise and sure in performance. He was thorough. Whatever he did was well done in complete and the divine exhortation, "whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do with thy might". A successful farmer and business man this thoroughness coupled with his sense of honor won for him the esteem of all with whom he engaged in business transactions.

As a friend he was ever loyal, helpful, affectionate and tender thus casting forth the best qualities of others. As a Christian he loved the church and moulded his life according to the divine pattern active in all good works and ever ready to give the oil of joy for mourning and the garment of praise for the spirit of heaviness. To him may be applied the words, "blessed are the pure in heart," for like Tennyson's hero "he revered his conscience as his king wearing the white flower of a blameless life".

We hesitate to enter into the sacredness of his home, but he leaves a beautiful benediction as a son, a husband and a father. Further, the nobility of his nature, was shown in his effective devotion to his aged grandmother who for some years was an inmate of his home.

As a citizen he was progressive and calm and sane in judgment and ever ready to work for the

good of the community. As a member of the Orange Lodge he was true to the high ideals of the association love of country, love of his fellow men, loyalty to the principles of the bible, etc., and in his office of worshipful master he was always true to his trust. Mrs. Robertson daughter of Mr. Harding Frason of Elmira and her two year old daughter have the sympathy of many friends; for many hearts are heavy with sorrow over the passing away of this much loved young man.

The funeral service was conducted at his home by Rev. R. L. Morton, pastor of the Baptist church of which the departed was a much prized member.

At this service a letter was read from Rev. Wallace R. MacWalker, a fellow student of Acadia college and a subsequent pastor testifying to the exemplary life of Walter Robertson during his student days and speaking words of appreciation of his sincere christian character during the years they were associated in christian work in the relation of pastor and church member.

Following the service of the church, the local Orange Lodge conducted the services of the order led by worshipful minister Earle Kennedy and Chaplain, Joshua F. MacDonald. The funeral was one of the largest ever seen in Kings County and in a flower bed graves the body of this one of God's choicest men was sorrowfully and tenderly laid away to await the resurrection of the just.
