P. E. I. WINS INTER-MARITIME RIFLE MATCH. HALIFAX, June 15.—Favored with ideal weather conditions, the inter-maritime rifle match between teams representing Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick, took place yesterday at Bedford Range. The crack Prince Edward Island team, who last year in winning the trophy established a record which at the time was considered to be a score that would stand for some years, surpassed all previous efforts with the high mark of 779 giving the large margin of 16 points over their previous total of 763 which they established on their own range last year in breaking the previous record. Opening in the morning at the 200 yard range the riflemen were favored with good visibility and consistent light which lasted throughout the afternoon when competition at the 500 and 600 yard range took place. The New Brunswick team gained second place with the high total of 762 points, beating the Nova Scotia representatives score of 732 by 30 points, and also claimed the individual honors of the day through the particularly good shooting of McLaughlin with the top score of 102, this mark being closely contested by McCabe of Prince Edward Island, who although shooting the same total, lost out at the 600 yards through drawing a "magpie" in the first round.
