THERE is no country, probably, that does not possess resources and opportunities peculiar to itself as there is no man or woman who does not possess abilities and talent along some line which can be used to good advantage.

Many people in this province are raising Angora rabbits—more as pets than for commercial purposes, probably because they have no idea of their commercial value. Our lady readers know the value of the Angora wool they buy in very small quantities, because they cannot get larger and because, if they could, the price would be exorbitant.

Does anyone see in this a prospect for a profitable industry in this province? It is ours if we go after it. No doubt all necessary information may be obtained by anyone desiring it. In the meantime we regard it as another opportunity knocking at our door.

Some may see, in a cause an opportunity to have their own particular axe ground but, after all, the cause is the main thing and should not be prejudiced by a too ardent search for the axe.

It is a serious mistake, a mistake amounting to a crime, to frighten a child of any age by threatening the police, a bogey man or any other of the terrible things that may happen, if he or she is not good.

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Notes by the Way

"CANADA is prosperous," is the word on every hand and it is true. This wide-spread prosperity is being very much exploited by the Liberal press, always carrying with it the inference and frequently the direct statement that it is due to the wisdom and statesmanship of the King Government.

Much of the progress which is so apparent in the development of manufacturing industry and production is due to hydro-electric power in Quebec, Ontario and Manitoba. Without this power, provided in such abundance by nature, and harnessed by human skill and capital, the marvelous expansion of the pulp and paper industry and the wonderfully rich gold, silver and copper mining industry of the country could not have attained a tithe of its present proportions.

Yet Canada prospers not because the eighteen Ministers of the King Government are in power, but in spite of that fact, and because of better reasons above pointed out. Canada prospers because eight of the nine millions of the Canadian people live in the favored provinces west of the Maritimes.

The local Governments in many of the Provinces, notably in Ontario and Quebec, have contributed to the prosperity of their people by legislation and administration, in developing hydro-electric power, improving their highways and in other ways far beyond anything that has been done or attempted by the King Government.

No. 13: Learning by Doing

This is a fact that not only is acknowledged as an educational principle of primary significance, but also is one that is readily understood. A few examples will clearly illustrate the principle.

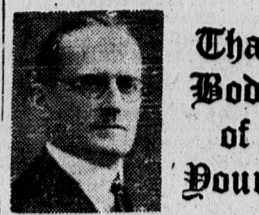
What is true in a physical way is equally true in the intellectual field. If one were merely told about arithmetic, one would not become proficient in computation.
