A Tooth Powder

It is nearly forty years since the Natural History Society of Prince Edward Island published a "List of Prince Edward Island Plants," and 22 years since a more complete list by MacSwain, appeared as a supplement to Sprout's Botany.

I. RANUNCULACEAE

- Tall Meadow-Rue, (Thalictrum Polygamum, Muhl. The T. pubescens of Bain may be the variety hebecarpum, Fernald, whose sphenes are pubescent (M:400) Common White Water-crowfoot, Ranunculus aquatilis, L., var trichophyllus, Gray. Several synonyms (M: 394). Seaside Crowfoot (R. Cymbalaria, Pursh.) (M:394). Yellow Water Crowfoot, (R. multifidus Pursh.), a synonym of R. delphinifolius, (M:395). Small-flowered Crowfoot, (R. abortivus, L.) (M:396). Cursed Crowfoot, (R. scleratus, L.) (M:396). Creeping Crowfoot or Buttercup, (R. repens, L.) M:397. Bulbous C. or Buttercup, (R. bulbosus, L.) M: 398. Tall C. or Buttercup, (R. acris, L.) M:398. Marsh Marigold, (Caltha palustris, L.) M:404.
