OLD SPANISH COINS—Mr. E. C. Webb, Cavendish, has in his possession three old silver Spanish coins of the size of quarters. That they are very old is evident from the fact that one of them is dated 1710 in the time of Carlos III, while a second is inscribed as Carlos II, but the date is blurred. The third is of the reign of Carlos IV. On the obverse side the inscription reads "Carolus II D. G." and on the reverse "Hispaniarum Rex, 1710."

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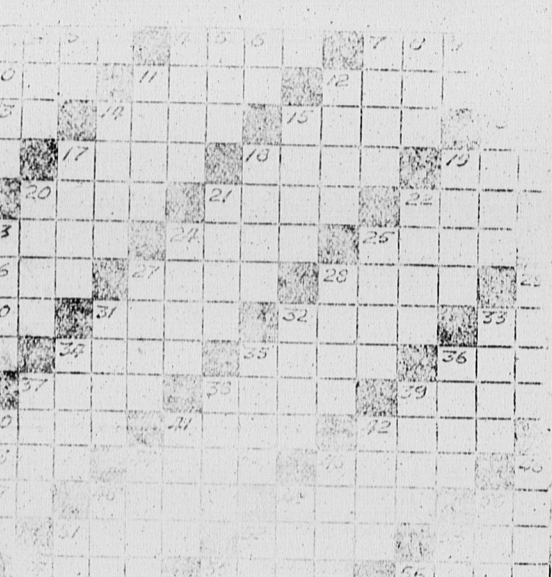
