THE CHINESE SITUATION.

Amid all the confusion of contradictory reports that reach us from China it becomes apparent that the situation is slowly taking a shape not unfavorable to the British policy of maintaining the integrity of the Chinese Empire, with the Manchu dynasty at its head and with the open door policy in regard to outside commercial relations. The astute Empress Dowager has apparently become convinced that the foreigners cannot be turned out of China, and that only a prompt reversal of her policy of aiding the Boxers can save to her a semblance of the power which she usurped and has held for years. Hence we have the deposition and disgrace of Prince Tuan and other officials who were her instruments in promoting and maintaining the insurrection; we see Chinese troops now pursuing the Boxers with relentless severity, while the Emperor Kwang Su, who had been for years a mere prisoner in his palace, is again nominally at the head of affairs, issuing edicts and exercising a measure of imperial control.

Fighting between the Allied and Chinese forces has ceased, and although peace and order have not been restored throughout the vast territory of China, it is evident that the work of pacification is making progress. These are great gains, and they give hope that a great international danger has been for the time averted. Behind the scenes the diplomats are doubtless busy, each striving to gain advantage for the nation he represents, while jointly they are endeavoring to reach the terms of a permanent settlement. The process is in its nature a slow one, for at every step, and in regard to every new proposal the Governments of London, St. Petersburg, Berlin, Paris, Vienna, Rome, Washington and Tokyo have to be consulted. The number of nations concerned thus makes the process of settlement slow, but at the same time serves to give assurance that in the end the conclusions that will be reached will be conducive to the interests of the world's commerce and the world's peace.

THE PATRIOTIC MONUMENT FUND.

It has become at once apparent that the proposed to erect a public monument to our fallen heroes has touched a popular chord. We hear only expressions of warm approval and commendation from citizens on every side. With these come suggestions that are of undoubted value. Among them is that of Col. Moore, that names of the entire Island quota should be inscribed upon the Memorial, that their fame may go down to posterity in company with their brave but fallen comrades with whom they fought with courage and fortitude side by side.

Another proposition is that the Provincial Government and the City Council ought each to contribute handsomely to the cost of the Memorial. There are strong reasons why they should do so. The proposed monument will be for the entire Province and will embody invisible and permanent for the patriotic sentiment of all the Island people. At the same time it will be an ornament to the Capital City and a source of proper pride to every citizen when it is erected. We doubt not therefore that the people of both the Province and the City would heartily endorse the action of their respective Governments should they decide to contribute liberally to this worthy public object. The brave men in the Island Contingent represented both parties, all classes and creeds, and hence there would not and could not be

any objection to such a course of action by the public authorities.

But nothing that the Government or City Council can do will obviate the importance of general public subscriptions. The movement is in its very nature a popular one. No mere gift by the Government can take the place, or awaken and maintain the general patriotic interest in such a Memorial as individual contributions would do. Those who contribute directly and individually to the Fund will feel that their patriotism is a real and tangible thing and that they have a proprietary interest in the Monument as it rises, and as it stands in fair proportions in the public gaze. Young and old should contribute—the men and women of the nineteenth century now closing, and the boys and girls who are to be the men and women of the twentieth century. With what pride in after years, one of these boys or girls will gaze upon the Soldiers' Monument, and say, "I had a share in its erection; I contributed of my small, youthful savings to its cost."

By Province and City and by the multitude of individual contributions let this Memorial rise, the People's Memorial to brave Islanders who fought and fell "to make the bounds of British freedom wider yet." Not in vain they fought and fell. A free and regenerated South Africa will be a memorial of their prowess in the eyes of the world in all ages to come. But South Africa is too far-off for us and our children to see. Here in this fair Island which they loved, in the sight of their kinsmen of present and future generations let their Monument stand, a testimony to our recognition of valiant worth, a witness of our veneration for noble deeds, a record that our own sons have won a place among the bravest of the brave, that we remember them among the most manful defenders of the nation.

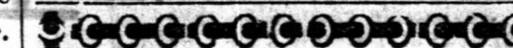
The Canadian Magazine, which is neutral in politics, in its October number gives what it calls a forecast of the general elections. Commenting on the absence of any great issue in the contest, the general position is stated in a sentence: "The Opposition must attack an entrenched enemy with small arms, and the conflict promises small success to be attacking party." Still this writer thinks it possible that Sir Charles Tupper may carry a majority of ten in Ontario, and seven more in the far western provinces and territories. He would even give them one more in Prince Edward Island. On the other side the opinion is expressed that the Liberal majority in Quebec will more than offset all Conservative majorities farther west while Mr. Blair in New Brunswick will have five or six seats to the good and Mr. Fielding is sure of a majority of four and probably more in Nova Scotia. The writer concludes that the Laurier Government is assured of a second term with a comfortable majority.

The Toronto Telegram, Conservative, states it has good authority for announcing that the general elections will be held October 30th. We do not believe the elections will come so soon, and cannot think the Telegram would be the first Canadian newspaper to learn the date. The Liberal nominations not being yet made in Montreal, St. John and some other important centres makes it appear that all is not yet ready for polling at so early a date as that named.

It is stated that the Quebec Premier would like to dissolve the Legislature there and hold the provincial elections at the same time as the federal. The Quebec House was elected in 1897 and would in any case expire next year. Such a coincidence of federal and provincial elections is, on general principles undesirable, though it has sometimes been resorted to in the past by both Conservative and Liberal leaders.
