Notes by the Way

The Dominion of Canada is fifty-nine years old today, dating its birth from July 1, 1867. On that date the Provinces of Canada, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia were united in one Dominion and the two Provinces of Upper Canada and Lower Canada, which have been united, were divided from each other and given their new names of Ontario and Quebec. That was a first step in the re-organization of the British Empire and has since been followed by the formation of other Dominions overseas.

Canada led the way in this great movement, introducing the federal form of union instead of legislative union, and continuing the Provincial Governments and Legislatures with limited powers. This plan has been followed in the Commonwealth of Australia and the Union of South Africa since established and has proved to be generally acceptable.

The four Provinces of British North America which were united in 1867 had a population of about three millions. The new Province of Manitoba was established in 1870, British Columbia was brought into the union in 1871 and Prince Edward Island in 1873. Since then the two new Provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta have been established between Manitoba and the Rocky Mountains, thus completing the chain of Provinces across the continent from ocean to ocean.

The Dominion of Canada has now some nine millions of people, or approximately three times the number it had in July, 1867. And it is safe to say that the progress made in developing the great natural resources of the country, providing means of transportation, extending industry, production and trade and in the creation of material wealth has considerably exceeded the growth in population.

The period covered by the life of the Dominion has been a most eventful one. Throughout the world tremendous upheavals and commotions have occurred in which both the Empire and our own Dominion have been sharers in the greatest of all wars, but under a beneficent Providence neither Canada nor the Empire has suffered any loss of liberty or of territory.

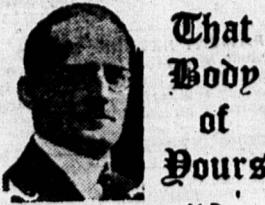
It is in the nature of things that the Dominion, from its vast area and its mixed population speaking different languages, has encountered difficult problems, some of which are yet unsolved. And it seems most regrettable that the centennial anniversary of this year falls at a time of political deadlock at Ottawa. A session of Parliament that has been unusually prolonged and is yet unfinished has brought about the downfall of the Government.

Parliament and people are beset with political troubles which have become acute just at the moment when Canada should be celebrating her birthday. But the crisis will pass and the present storm clouds which darken the political sky will in due time disappear. That there are bright, happy and prosperous days in store for Canada in the near future we do not doubt.

There must presently be a general election. It is not a thing to be feared. The heart of Canada is sound, her people are intelligent and endowed with saving common sense. They see the pressing need of re-establishing stable and honest government in the land and in due time, the people will bring it about.

Chat Body of Hours. By James W. Burton, M.D.

ARTIFICIAL SUNLIGHT

A way back in 1859 a Frenchman discovered that certain rays from the sun had a beneficial effect upon the skin that could not be attributed to the heat alone. About twenty years later a couple of Englishmen discovered that the light of the sun's rays, and not the heat, was what destroyed certain little destructive organisms.

Then Koch, the celebrated discoverer of the organism that causes tuberculosis, was able to show the benefit to tuberculous patients from the rays of the sun. This was about 1890. Then the Norwegian physician Phasen treated skin conditions with those same ultra violet rays, derived from a special lamp, about 1893. And now in our day we find the ultra violet ray lamps as part of the equipment of many hospitals.

In children's hospitals where there are so many little sufferers with tuberculosis of the bones, where operations are frequently necessary and where they must spend months strapped to frames, the work of these special sunshine lamps is proving a wonderful blessing. With youngsters suffering with rickets, or softening of the bones, or bow legs, narrow chests, and protruding abdomen, these ultra violet rays are actually changing the shape of the youngsters in conditions where the blood is thin and the child is practically wasting away, these rays have the effect of increasing the number and richness of the blood cells. Where youngsters are suffering with chronic ailments, and are putting up a long continued fight with some slow illness, the effect of these rays is to turn the tide in favor of health, and their recovery follows in a short time.

This is due to the double effect of enriching the blood as above, and of stimulating the little white blood cells which fight off the poison which have got into the system. The treatment by this lamp method is now on a scientific basis. Usually about twelve treatments are given, three a week for four weeks, the exposure being limited with two minutes for first treatment and increasing up to thirty minutes for the final treatment.

Of course my thought is the same old thought, that those of us who get our rays in their natural form, should see to it that we do not neglect to obtain these rays of health.
