SHAMROCKSWIN OPENING GAME OF TOUR

Frankie LeBlanc Gets Lone Tally For English Team.

(Canadian Press Cable)
LONDON, Nov. 29.—The Ottawa Shamrocks hockey team tonight defeated England 7-1 in the first game of its current European tour. The match was played at the Park Lane Ice Club.

The Shamrocks, who reached London only yesterday after their long ocean voyage, put on a brilliant display that kept the crowd on its toes throughout the game. The match was fast and clean. No penalties were handed out.

At the request of the Canadians the teams dressed 10 men each.

Kenny Draper opened the scoring for the visitors as the end of three minutes. Two minutes later Lou Bates barged through the English defence and notched the second point. The homesters then tightened up and no more scoring occurred during the frame.

Bill Reinhardt, whom English critics acclaimed as the Ottawa star, scored early in the second period and was followed by Joe Shields. Thereafter LeBlanc scored England's only point from a scramble in front of the goal. England again improved but Draper, Dan Cowley and Tag Miller each tallied. Miller was credited with three assists.

The third period went scoreless.

British Official For Jamaica

Abegweits Climb In Standing With Shutout Victory

Kane And Lawlor Get Goals As Redshirts Overcome Beavers 2 0, To Chalk Up First Road Win.

SAINTE JOHN, N. B., Nov. 29.—Saint John Beavers sank deeper into the cellar of the Maritime Hockey League tonight as Charlottetown Abegweits administered a 2-0 shut-out. The Abegweits succeeded Halifax in second place as a result of the league-leading Moncton Hawks' victory over the Wolverines tonight.

Play here was generally slow, with Charlottetown outplaying and outskating the Beavers. Only four penalties were imposed. Kane, assisted by McArthur, tallied in the second, and Lawlor, unassisted, ended the scoring in the third.

Saint John played without their left winger, Clint Gammon, who is still in hospital recovering from a bruised muscle injured in a previous game. "Secret" Kuhn, former Wolverines goalie reported to have signed with the Abbies, did not appear tonight. Ken Carroll, former Bathurst star, made his first appearance with Beavers and caught the fancy of the crowd by clever stick-handling.

Wilson Saves Score

Charlie Wilson's masterful save to frustrate an Abegweit marker was the crowning play of the first period. Wee Hymie McArthur sneaked into the clear in front of Charlie's doorstep and was set to beat Wilson as he waited a pass that sped to him from inside the blue line. Wilson sprawled headlong in a swift dive along the ice, smothering the pass as it reached McArthur.

Later the Saint John goalie was called upon to demonstrate his fending off ability as Lawlor and Hudson closed in on him at high speed, the rubber headed their way from a team-mate. Wilson intercepted the long pass and drove it out of danger.

Abbies Outkate Elvals

With neither team showing their best efforts the visiting club outskated the homesters. McCann's save, while only a dozen, were timely, as most of the shots fired by Beavers markers were on the net. Hudson's shooting forced the former Fredericton net minder to bicker in high gear.

A smacking disc from mid-ice almost registered just as the gong rang, Wilson having some difficulty in keeping the puck from rolling across the goal line. The only penalty of the session was handed out to "Peck" Donald who went to the cooler for a two minute stretch for elbowing Walker when the big guard blocked the left winger.

The second period was more lively and Beavers staged a number of opening assaults that failed, however, to break the count after Abbies had tallied the first score of the evening following four minutes of play.

McArthur To Kane Pass Registers

McArthur worked his way in a weaving rush across the last blue

line to a point deep inside the Saint John zone. His pass to Kane was converted into the tally when the right winger from Ontario drove true to the corner of the cage beyond Wilson's reach.

A Saint John gang attack of three and then four red-shirted raiders gave McCann some trouble and then Walker's express train rush the length of the rink almost netted another goal for Charlottetown.

Wilson, with the able support of his colleagues, was the busiest man in the rink at one time as the second Abegweit line stormed into the Beaver defence and stayed there a minute or two. Near the close two penalties were imposed, one to each club. Currie was banished for holding Doucet. He was joined soon by Reist who hooked McArthur when trying to stop the other from raging.

Beavers Press Hard

A two-minute sentence to Currie for roughing Dickson, after five minutes of the final session had elapsed signaled the most sustained attack of the night, Beavers keeping up the bombardment even after the grinning blond guard returned to his post. Four and five men inside the enemy sector beset the Abbies for a five minute stretch.

The most successful relief measure for the leading club was to fling the puck the length of the ice and let Beavers skate after it. Beavers attempted every trick in their bag but could not dent the McCann twins. Several times the Islanders almost caught the losers flat-footed with men harrassing the Abbies but Draper and Wilson in turn halted the scries.

Lawlor finally coasted down on Draper all alone, was turned toward the corner and lifted the puck goalward. It lodged high in the cords in the corner removed from Wilson for the last tally of the night. The few pags at Wilson were dangerous as the period closed, and McCann also had several close calls.

Sensational Work By Moncton Goalie Frustrates Wolves

Dominion Champions Win From Desperate Halifax Team In Second Overtime — Score Is 3-2

HALIFAX, Nov. 29.—(G. P.)—Swinging into their old championship stride doughty Moncton Hawks tonight outplayed the Halifax Wolverines in the lead of the Maritime Hockey League standing by turning back the Halifax Wolverines, 3-2.

Before the biggest crowd of the season that jammed its way into the Forum, Hawks and Wolves fought a fast, rugged battle that ended in the dying moments of the second overtime period as Bert Connolly poked a fast rebound from Bill Miller's shot and snapped it past the harrassed Sargent.

But it was the sensational guarding of Slim Jimmie Foster that time after time frustrated the constant barrage of flying pucks from Halifax forwards. Even the Wolf shock troops left their defence posts and descended with their forwards on the enemy goal whenever Referee Harry Butler chased any of the Hawks to the penalty box.

It was during the absence of Gill and McDonald that Cowley shot down the ice and passed to Gagnon, who surprised Foster, to put Wolves in the lead after they had fought strenuously to break the one-all tie.

Hawks, however, soon relieved the tension for themselves when McDonald and McManus joined sticks to tie the score. From then on play was fast, rugged and see-sawing back and forth until near the end of the second overtime period when Connolly again scored on the rebound of a fast shot from Miller's stick who had made an end-to-end rush.

The second period had seen two goals scored, one for each team. Gill scored the first for the Hawks when he rushed through the enemy, shot a fast one, and banged his rebound home. Gagnon and Cowley were the stars for the Wolverines, when the pair scored both goals for the Halifax team.

Sensational net minding by both the goalies featured the game, and time after time they frustrated sure goals. At times the Halifax defence looked foolish during attacks from the swooping Hawks.

One of the spectators was sorely injured when a puck flew over the boards to smash his glasses. However he was soon fixed up and came back to see the rest of a game, witnessed by more than 6,000 people who wanted to see the Canadian champions in action for their first time in Halifax this season. And the game was well worth the money, for they were treated to one of the most thrilling games

ever seen in this city. At the beginning of the second period, Dud James innocently fell while trying to stick handle through the Wolverine defense. He was removed to the dressing room, but came back near the end of the same period with a bandage round his head. Through the third period he was used sparingly apparently only because he insisted on playing.

Penalties nearly proved costly for the Hawks on all occasions. Whenever Moncton lost a man, the whole Wolverine team swarmed around Jimmie Foster, in desperate attempts to score. However they only scored once during these rugged times, and that was when Gill and McDonald were in the cooler together early in the third period, when the Wolves swung into the lead for a time.

At one time when the Wolverines were peppering Foster with shots, Connolly broke away on a lone sally, tore down the ice, only to be met by Sargent who made what looked to be an impossible save.

All goals were well earned, but the Hawks were able to make more use of their opportunities than the Wolverines, who could not seem to beat Foster. Goal tending was made doubly hard near the end of the game, when huge signs bearing the words "no smoking" could hardly be seen through the dense clouds of smoke.
