**DRESSING FOR LEATHER.**

An effective leather dressing is made with one part vinegar to two parts linseed oil shaken vigorously in a bottle. This dressing should be gently rubbed into the leather with a rag. Then rub with a soft duster and finish the polishing process with a chamois leather.

The treatment may be applied to leather upholstery, suit-cases, trunks, and bags of all descriptions. Not only will it render the leather pliable, but it will make it look like new. When the leather shows sign of wear white of egg should be painted on the worn part some days before applying the linseed oil and vinegar.

**Moncton Suspect In Corkum Case Given Freedom**

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 7.—Ernest Essery, arrested in Moncton Friday as a suspect in the fatal shooting here on Tuesday last of Leslie A. Corkum Spring garden road Grocer, was given his liberty Saturday night following an examination which convinced the local police that he had no connection with the crime. Essery said he was a carpenter by trade and gave a satisfactory account of his recent movements.

The body of the dead man, who passed away from his wounds Friday evening, will be taken to his home at Chester N. S. for burial.

**St. John Woman Dies From Effects Of Cocaine Poison**

MONTREAL, Nov. 7.—The police are looking for three men wanted by the local coroner's court officials in connection with the death of Mrs. Lulu Strang, of St. John N.B. who died last week at the Notre Dame Hospital from what is stated as cocaine poisoning. For this purpose the inquest that was to have opened Saturday was adjourned, that further enquiry might be made.

Fact collected so far indicate that Mrs. Strang had been seen just prior to her death drinking beer with three young men, as a sequel to which she fell into a sleep that lasted two days. She was subsequently taken ill and died. Analysis of the contents of the contents of her stomach showed that death was due to cocaine poisoning.

**Battleship's Keels Must Be Laid In 1922**

LONDON, Nov. 7.—Great Britain must decide definitely before the end of the year whether or not she intends to build two battleships which were sanctioned by the Washington Naval agreement. In the agreement it was stipulated that their keels must be laid in 1922. Reports that the new government might abandon plans for building the new ships could not be verified to-day. Orders for their construction were issued recently. Lord Beatty in a speech last week declared his country would not decrease her naval strength below the number of ships stipulated in the Washington agreement.

**Three Ohio River Steamers Are Burned At Dock**

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Nov. 7.—Three Ohio River steamers, the Island Queen and Morning Star, owned by the Coney Island Company which operates a summer resort 12 miles above Cincinnati and the Tacoma, a passenger and freight steamer, and two wharf boats, the property of the Coney Island and Green line companies, were destroyed by fire yesterday. A fourth boat, the Chris Greene, employed in tow boat service, caught fire and was badly damaged. The total loss was estimated to be between \$250,000 and \$300,000. Firemen say that a barrel of tar used in making repairs on the Morning Star boiled over and caused the fire.

**Cattle Agreement Is Satisfactory**

LONDON, Nov. 7.—Before sailing from Southampton for home, Dr. Grisdale, Canadian Federal Deputy Minister of Agriculture, who took part in the negotiations regarding legislation necessary to remove the embargo against Canadian shore cattle said the Anglo-Canadian agreement would be published in Great Britain in a few days. It was, he said, satisfactory to both parties though from the Canadian point of view the Dominion did not get quite all that was desired.

**A TRIP INTO SPACE.**

With a Peep at the Milky Way and its Fiery Spiral Nebula.

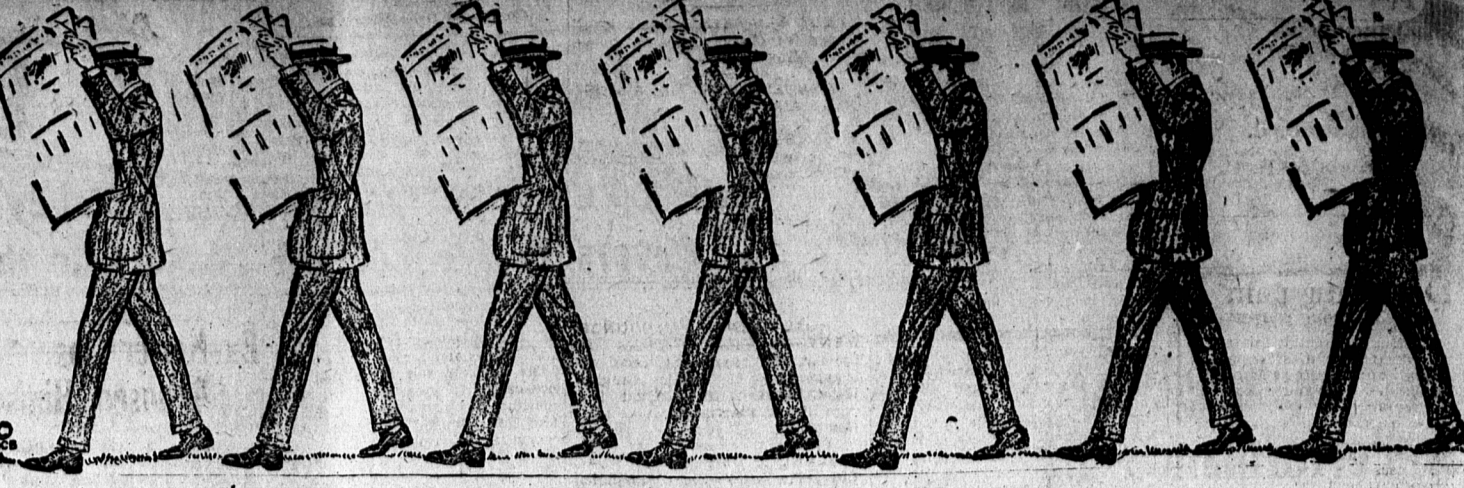
If you could stand still and let the world glide from under you the most impressive characteristic of space would be its emptiness, its awful black silence, of which man knows about as much as the deep sea fish do of their ocean. As the sun went sailing away its planets would close in one by one until apparently consumed by the solar rays. Before you had passed through the orbit of Neptune the sun would look no larger than an arc light. Painter and fainter it would finally fade into a pitiful spark. In spite of your tenser effort to keep that glinting point clear of its fellows, it would at last melt into the multitude of soft lights that make up the Milky Way, and henceforth, seek as you might, you could never distinguish your sun again. Lost in the Milky Way it would be as futile to try to find it as to find a certain grain of dust which you had noticed settling on a country road.

Then drifting satellites out into inky nothingness you would be surrounded by myriads of brilliant lights. Soon they would impress you with this startling fact: The universe of stars is arranged like a mighty world. The Milky Way encircles the skies very much as the equator does this earth, and since life is most abundant in the south so the stars grow thickest about the Milky Way. Let the eye travel away toward the imaginary north and south poles, and not only do the stars thin out, but entirely new forms of star life make their appearance.

Through the telescope they are nothing more than filmy patches of light; to the cameras and spectroscopes of observatories they become the most amazing and frightful spectacles of all nature. They show themselves then to be stupendous whirlpools of fire, inconceivable in magnitude, thousands of "light years" away (light traveling 185,000 miles a second) where whole systems of suns are being slowly evolved. We call them "spiral nebula," but to describe them we need the tongue of God himself. They seem to be measureless cauldrons, where his hand stirs cosmic dust until new suns rise and float off in flaming bubbles. There are so unthinkably gigantic that there is no perceptible motion to them. Already the cameras have recorded several hundred thousand in every stage of condensation, presenting an undeniable challenge, perhaps an answer, to those who would solve the riddle of the universe.—Maxwell Parry in Chicago Herald.

**RADIO ON TRAINS.**

Radiophone equipment has been put on trains of two railroads in this country, says Popular Mechanics Magazine, namely, the Lackawanna and the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul. Both these companies have converted buffet cars into virtual receiving stations, wherein the passengers can don headphones and listen to the various broadcasting. The coaches are surmounted by special aerials running the length of the cars, and are of different construction, the Lackawanna using six wires and the other road two, with the entire set being grouped through the axles to the rails.

**SAVE YOUR GAS.**

Once water has reached its boiling point, you cannot make it any hotter. If you increase the size of the flame under a boiling saucepan, the water will bubble furiously, but the temperature, in spite of appearances, will remain the same.

At sea-level water boils at 212 degrees Fahrenheit; if greater heat is applied it will merely produce steam. The higher you go the lower is the boiling-point. Explorers at great heights often find it difficult to cook their food for this reason.

You cannot boil a potato on the top of a high mountain, simply because you cannot make the water hot enough. At the top of Mount Everest furiously boiling water would not be hot enough to scald your finger. On the shores of the Dead Sea, which lies 1,200 feet below sea-level, an egg can be boiled in two and a half minutes at the summit of Ben Nevis.

It has been calculated that in the average house a pound's worth of gas is wasted every year; pans are left boiling over full-flamed burners, though once water has boiled a tiny flame is sufficient to keep it at the hottest temperature.

Sir Henry Curtis Bennett, eminent English criminal lawyer, was once a secret service expert. He is still on the sunny side of 45 and has been a barrister for not quite twenty years. A third asset in an exigent profession belongs to Sir Henry. He is tall rather than short; and inclined to stoutness, rather than the reverse. His face is full and smiling; the face one sees in a cathedral close. He is a facile speaker; but he can be very sparing of his words.

In the war he obtained a commission as Lieutenant in the R.N.V.R. His criminal practice had given him a peculiar knowledge of the ways and habits of thought of that underworld from which most spies are recruited. And it was to this knowledge that the Government had recourse when Curtis Bennett was asked to join the Special Branch at Scotland Yard under Sir Basil Thompson.
