No Plans For Appointment Of New Gov. General

OTTAWA, Jan. 5 (CP)—The Dominion government, because of the war, plans no early steps with regard to appointment of a successor to Lord Tweedsmuir whose term as Governor-General expires this year, Prime Minister Mackenzie King said today.

The next vice-regal representative likely will be appointed shortly before Lord Tweedsmuir's return to the United Kingdom next summer or in the early fall, the Prime Minister said.

Mr. Mackenzie King indicated Lord Tweedsmuir's health is such that he feels unable to accept any extension of his term as Governor-General.

The Prime Minister expressed deep appreciation of Lord Tweedsmuir's service as Governor-General and said he felt regret that his excellency was unable to agree to an extension of his five-year term.

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Economic Aid By Canadians Is Considered

OTTAWA, Jan. 5 (CP)—Methods by which Canadians may best send economic aid to the distressed people of Finland are receiving consideration of the government, Prime Minister Mackenzie King said today.

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Will Discuss

OTTAWA, Jan. 5 (CP)—The departure of Canada's second division of the Canadian Active Service Force for overseas service will likely come up for discussion in the House of Commons, Prime Minister Mackenzie King said at a press conference.

Quarried at his second press conference of the war about the possible date of departure of the division, the Prime Minister replied: "I am so completely a devotee of the matter that I don't think I should say anything about it at the moment, when Parliament meets, the problem will likely be discussed."

Four Flying Beats Off On Atlantic Flights

HAMILTON, Bermuda, Jan. 3 (CP)—For the first time in the history of transatlantic flying four great passenger planes of one line were crossing the ocean simultaneously today.

While two clipper ships of Pan-American Airways were flying eastward from here another pair was bound for Bermuda from Horta, the Azores. All four took off today.

The American clipper left Bermuda at 4:11 p. m. and the Yankee followed at 4:56 p. m. Both headed for Horta. The Dixie and Atlantic Clippers had left Horta a short time ago.

Heavy seas at Horta had resulted in two ships being delayed at each base. The American clipper had been waiting here 11 days, and the Yankee clipper five. They carried 17 and 17 passengers, respectively.

N. S. Resident Slugged By Unknown Persons

PEMBROKE, N. S., Jan. 3 (CP)—Eldon S. Millett, 65-year-old merchant here was slugged by an unknown assailant or assailants, a coroner's jury decided today at an inquest. Millett was found lying in a pool of blood in his store last Thursday and he died yesterday without regaining consciousness.

Although \$90 in bills was found in Millett's pocket it is believed the "was the motive for the crime. Usually, witnesses said, Millett carried a more substantial sum upon his person and he also carried cheques and other papers which were missing.

A neighbor, Mrs. Nancy Montell, told coroner Dr. F. R. Shankel Millett had told her of "men lurking in the neighborhood" and of hearing a general rattle.

Millett kept a general store and supplied motorists' needs in his small village near Windsor. He kept bachelor quarters in a flat adjoining the store.

According to medical evidence, Millett was struck from behind by a blunt instrument and then perhaps as he sprawled on the floor, was struck again three times.

Time of the beating which led to his death was established at between five and nine p. m. last Thursday. He was seen in the early evening of that day by a neighbor.

Millett's horses which he invariably bedded down between eight and nine o'clock in the evening were found Friday morning untended.

Chester Millett, a nephew, and his sister, Mrs. Margaret Whyedon, who lives in Moreton, N. B., told of seeing a light burning in the store Thursday night. They thought it unusual but did not investigate the following morning.

Chester found his uncle's body lying beside the stove in the store. Funeral services will be held tomorrow.
