SELF-GOVT. FOR PHILIPPINES

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) **MANILA, Nov. 15**—(Friday)—Self-government returned to the Philippine Islands today after nearly 400 years.

With whistles and firecrackers Filipinos hailed the day that marked establishment of their commonwealth government and the beginning of a 10 year march to complete independence.

Two before the scheduled inauguration of dynamic little Manuel Quezon as the first Philippine President the streets of Manila rang with merrymaking.

But the gaily and excitement could not drown the faint rumble of extremist dissatisfaction. More than 2,000 constabulary soldiers detailed to preserve order, were alert for possible trouble. Quezon was heavily guarded because of many assassination threats.

Two apparently incendiary fires added to recurrent rumors of extremist activity.

Most of the dissatisfaction was over Quezon's leadership. His followers were accused of election frauds and his foes have contended his regime would stifle representative government.

United States troops were available in the event of need.

S.H. Logan Heads Canadian Bankers' Assn.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) **MONTREAL, Nov. 14**—S. H. Logan of Toronto, general manager and director of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, was elected president of the Canadian Bankers' Association at the annual meeting today. He succeeded Jackson Dods, General Manager of the Bank of Montreal.

Mr. Logan, born at DeBert, N. S., April 24, 1881, began his career with the old Halifax Banking Company at Springhill and was transferred to Wianon, Ont., when the company was absorbed by the Bank of Commerce. Subsequently he served in northern Ontario and Newfoundland and through gradual promotions rose to the general management in 1926.

SHAWKEY TO QUIT BEARS

NEWARK, N. J., Nov. 15 — Bob Shawkey, former Yankee pitcher and manager of the Newark Bears in the International Baseball League for the past two seasons won't be at the head of the Bears in 1936, it was announced last night.

Shawkey, after a conference with club officials, agreed to relinquish the post and turn it over to a man who can devote his full and undivided attention to baseball.

The former Yankee hurler hopes, however, to continue in the game next season in some capacity. Much of his time is occupied throughout the year handling a gold mine which he owns in Northern Quebec.

George F. Weiss, vice president and general manager of the Bears, said: "Whoever will manage the Bears next season will be a man whose sole interest is baseball. J. Robert Shawkey, who has managed the club for the past two seasons, has outside business interests which demand some of his time the year round and this will prevent him from being at the helm in 1936."

Announcement of a new manager is expected later this week.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 15—Manager Rogers Hornsby of the St. Louis Browns confirmed last night for the benefit of other American League baseball clubs that he is seeking two pitchers, a hard-hitting outfielder and "what have you."

Hornsby, back from a barnstorming trip through Mexico with the American League All-Stars, discussed possible trades yesterday with vice president L. C. McGovoy.

"We will listen to any deal that promises to improve the Browns," Hornsby said. "But so far we have received no definite offers."

CINCINNATI, O., Nov. 15—Ballure of general manager Larry MacPhail to grant his request for a two year contract yesterday was reported as responsible for the refusal of Charles "Chuck" Dressen to sign as manager of the Cincinnati Reds for the coming baseball season.

Following a series of conferences here a week ago MacPhail was said to have offered Dressen a one year contract. MacPhail was reported to have told Dressen a club policy limited all contracts to one season.

Dressen was said to have considered the financial condition of the one year contract satisfactory, but wished to be signed for a longer period.
