ITALIANS WHO SUFFERED TERRIBLE TORTURES FROM THE TURKS IN TRIPOLI

Mutilated Bodies Tell A Tale of Fiendish Cruelties to Prisoners

ROME, Nov. 30—(By wire)—A party of officers, surgeons and reporters who have been searching Tripoli, retaken by the Italians on Nov. 26, found many bodies of Italians.

These bodies were atrociously mutilated. Some had been crucified and their eyelids stitched so they could not close them.

Some had been buried to their armpits, their hands lopped off and their eyes gauged.

The agonized faces of many suggest that they had to endure awful tortures.

An Italian who escaped by hiding for three days in a ditch, pretending he was dead and who witnessed the mutilations declares that Turkish officers and women were present.

Five Italians were buried alive up to their shoulders and allowed to starve to death.

ESTIMATES EXPECTED TO PASS TODAY

REBELS ARE AGAIN BEATEN IN CHINA

PEKIN, Nov. 30—(By Wire)—Consular reports from Szechuen announce that the Imperialists defeated the rebels in a battle in Nonginuan.

The missionaries are safe. Negotiations have been opened between General Chang commanding the Imperial troops and General Heng commanding the Revolutionaries for an armistice.

The armistice has already gone into effect, but General Chang reports that occasional firing occurs.

FATAL QUARREL IN CARD GAME

MONTREAL, Nov. 30—(By Wire)—In a quarrel over cards Robert Fitz-Simmons, chief usher in the Orpheum Theatre, was shot and killed by Charles Ross, solicitor for advertisements for the theatre program.

The shooting occurred in the check room in the basement of the theatre.

POVERTY VOW AND THE FRANCHISE

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 29—Does a person who enters a religious community and takes a vow of poverty, by that very fact lose his individuality in a political sense to such an extent that he must be denied the right to vote?

This is the question involved in a case taken on yesterday by Mr. Justice Charbonneau yesterday. Incidentally the judge declared his opinion that it was to the interest of ecclesiastics themselves and religion in general, for parish priests and members of religious orders to refrain from any participation in politics.

Edouard Boufque, had petitioned against the municipal council of the town of Rigaud, seeking to have the names of some sixteen people in the Catholic college of that place struck from the electoral list to the grounds that they were not qualified by reason of income to exercise the franchise.

Thirteen of these have taken the vows of the clerics of St. Victor while three are in teaching in the lower classes of the college course. St. important does Justice Charbonneau believe the issue to be, that he took the case under advisement.

ROBBER DEMANDED 1000 AND GOT IT

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 29—At the command of a man armed with a revolver but unmasked, a teller A. D. McLeod, of the Grandview branch of the Royal Bank of Canada today handed over \$1,000 cash, and the robber made his escape. Only a clerk or two were in the bank when the stranger entered. "Give me a thousand," he laconically ordered and the teller complied. The stranger pushing the roll of bills in his pocket hurried away. The man is described as a foreigner, 28 to 30 years of age.

The experts will try to determine why the scallops this season, are so much larger than formerly and whether or not they are of a species, or of a variety, which hitherto has inhabited only the deeper waters of the coast.

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Nov. 29—Two more of the five Italians who are accused of the murder of Mrs. Mary Hall at a farm house near Croton Lake, Nov. 9, were found guilty today, making three convictions. Vincenzo Carina was found guilty yesterday and quite as short work was made of the cases of Lorenzo Calci and Felipe Dimatco who were placed on trial this morning, and who heard their fate early this evening. The trial of two others accused will be begun Monday.

TORONTO, Nov. 30—(By Wire)—The Duke of Connaught has accepted the honorary Presidency of the National Sanitarium Association and expressed his warm interest in the work undertaken by the Association.

MAYOR GAYNOR'S IDEA OF THE NEWS-PAPER WORLD

NEW YORK, November 29—To a series of questions propounded to him on the subject, Mayor Gaynor issued an extended statement here today outlining his idea of an ideal American newspaper. Frequently in his speeches the mayor has criticized the press. His honor thinks that "A newspaper should show that there is a gentleman in control of it; a newspaper should be true—its motives fair. If the facts are not known an editorial should not be written. He would confirm expressions of opinion to the editorial columns. Headlines should be accurate and introduction stripped of verbiage. It would be a good thing if all articles were signed. The news columns should give all political news without regard to party, readers do not want all the testimony in divorce trials and sensational criminal cases. A decent, well bred official should not be cartooned as a ruffian and a loafer. No influence from advertisers should control news or editorial columns.

CREW OF PROSPECTOR REACHED PORT EXHAUSTED

LUNENBURG, November 29—The schooner Prospector, if days out from Grand Bank Newfoundland, bound to Halifax with two thousand quintals of dry fish, arrived at Mosher's Harbor, after a thrilling experience off the Nova Scotia coast. Her commander, Captain Matthews, reported it the worst trip he ever made. From the time the vessel left Grand Bank, it was one gale after another, and three times the vessel was off Halifax, only to be blown again to sea, one as far as Sable Island. The crew were exhausted when the schooner reached Mosher's Harbor, the vessel's sails were torn and fuel and provisions were running short.

WAS ROBBED

YONKERS, N. Y., Nov. 29—Three masked bandits bound and gagged Mrs. Alfred N. Seixas, a wealthy widow at her home today and robbed her of jewellery valued at \$25,000. The bandits entered the house during last night, while Mr. Seixas was away, and bound and gagged Jessie Carter, the negro servant. They waited until noon today for the return of the woman of the house.

Of Fourteen Cardinals. Red Sea Forts Bombarded by Italians

PERIM, Red Sea, Nov. 30—(By wire)—News is received that an Italian warship is bombarding Fort Sheikh Said on the Arabian coast.

The fortified seaport of Mocha on the Red Sea was bombarded this morning by Italian warships. No details were available.

ROME, Nov. 30—(By wire)—The concluding and most impressive ceremony connected with the creation of new Cardinals occurred this morning at a great public consistory at the Vatican when fourteen Princes of the Church were invested with the red hat indicating their rank.

There was tremendous excitement all over the city and inside the Vatican the only person who remained absolutely calm was the Pontiff himself.

ROME, Nov. 29—This afternoon all the new cardinals went to the Vatican, formed into procession and preceded and accompanied by the Swiss and Noble Guards and personages of the Papal Court, passed through the magnificent halls to the state apartment. The way was lined with guests, who had come to pay them homage.

The newly created cardinals were then introduced into the presence of the Pope. Pius X permitted each of the cardinals to kiss his hand and his foot, afterwards imposing upon each the red biretta as a first tangible proof of their supreme dignity. The ceremony of today will be followed on Thursday by the great public consistory during which the red hat will be conferred upon them.

ROME, Nov. 29—Col. Roosevelt while attending the performance by the Irish players of "The Playboy of the Western World" was shown the synopsis of Wharton Baker's testimony in Washington before the Senate Committee on Inter-State Commerce, in which Col. Roosevelt's name figured prominently. He read the statement carefully and then declared:

"I would as soon discuss a pipe dream with a patient out of Bedlam as discuss such nonsense."

Col. Roosevelt would not add to this statement, only repeating it later with added emphasis when pressed by other questions for an additional expression.

ROOSEVELT DECLARES STORY ALL NONSENSE

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WILL BE SCARCITY OF HOPS AND BARLEY

NEW YORK, November 29—A condition without precedent in the trade now confronts the brewers of the world. The production of barley and hops has been yearly decreasing, so that under normal crop conditions the world's supply would amount to little more than the actual requirements. The unprecedented drought in England and Northern Europe last summer had a disastrous effect upon all farm produce and was particularly severe with respect to hops and barley.
